Sometimes political correctness (PC) can get it wrong. Serena is a very well-paid sportsperson whose office is the world stage. If she decides to overstep the boundaries then there is a penalty to pay (just like everyone else), just like Kyrios when he decides to make poor choices.

In reading and writing, understanding cause and effect can help your child learn to read more critically and to write stories with captivating plots and fascinating characters. Some fabulous books you can read with your child to help them develop a deeper understanding of cause and effect include:

- o Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day by Judith Viorst
- o If you give a mouse a cookie by Laura Numeroff
- o The Rain Came Down by David Shannon
- Where Once there was a Wood by Denise Fleming
- There was an old lady who swallowed a fly by Pam Adamz



Don't forget to chat about what happened in the story and why. Ask your child what they might do if they were in that situation.

## **<u>Rights, Resilience and Respectful Relationships</u>**

The *Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships* learning materials use a range of collaborative learning strategies which in themselves, provide opportunities to develop social skills. The activities also explicitly engage with the key content areas of:

Emotional literacy • Decision making • Problem solving • Positive self-regard • Stress management
Positive coping
Help-seeking and peer support
Gender and identity
Positive gender relationships.

The teaching and learning activities use a range of collaborative learning activities such as paired sharing, small group problem solving, scenario-based discussions, skill development exercises, role plays, storytelling, games, experiential activities and class discussions. Use of these collaborative learning strategies requires the teacher to exercise a high level of facilitation to organise and moderate student interactions with the tasks and their peers.

The activities are designed to be delivered in sequence but can be modified by the teacher to suit the needs of the learners, and to integrate with their broader approach to teaching the Victorian Curriculum. Teachers are encouraged to use these learning activities in conjunction with other available curriculum in the broader health and wellbeing area. The activity plans include recommended links to relevant high-quality resources in the area of sexuality education, human rights education, gender education, and bullying and violence education. ## WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

#### FOUNDATION - Caz, Trish & Karen

We welcome back Mrs Shaw to the classroom, it sounds like she had a lovely time in Canberra with the Year 5/6 students. We thank Mrs Nara Nicoll and Mrs Trudy Vincent for working with the Foundation Shaw children.

A huge THANK YOU to Laura Tonkin from North East Health and Constable Phil Barnden from the Wangaratta Police who spoke to the children last week. Phoebe stated, 'Laura helps people get better, she gives them some needles.' Scarlet said, 'Phil Barnden taught us all about how police keep everything safe. And if you need something that you lost you can call 000.'

#### **Religion:**

TOMORROW we welcome you all to our Liturgy at 9.05am in the Foundation classroom. This week we continue our new unit, 'I Can Pray to God.' This week the students will discuss what prayer looks, sounds and feels like. They will participate in various forms of prayer e.g. meditation, song etc. The children will learn to pray the 'Our Father' through listening to John Burland's song.

#### Literacy:

This week each class will continue to read a Non-Fiction big book. The students will read many interesting facts from the texts and create their own fact book from what they have read. Isaac found out, 'There are two types of Whales, Toothed Whales and Baleen whales.' Harley found out, 'Some Dinosaurs eat plants and grass and some Dinosaurs eat meat.' Orla found out, 'Otters hold hands with their friends when they are lying on their backs in the water.'

#### Mathematics:

The students will investigate the concept of 'Sharing'. The students will use a range of practical strategies for sharing small groups of numbers, such as visual displays or concrete materials. What can your child share this week? eg share out the pack of cards when playing a game, share the bag of biscuits with the family etc.

#### Inquiry:

We continue to discuss how different people and places in our community, are there to help us. <u>Parent help</u> - If you are interested in talking about your role in the community, we would love to hear from you. We would like to use Wednesday mornings for this as a part of our learning rotations. Please contact Mrs Bray if you are interested. Thank you to the parents who have been able to join us at school to share your story.

#### YEAR ONE/TWO – Janina, Amanda, David, Fran, Elise & Erin

Thank you to those parents and friends who were able to attend our Liturgy last Thursday morning. Your support means a great deal to your child. The students conducted themselves in a very reverent manner and were very enthusiastic! Congratulations Year One and Two!

#### Upcoming Dates:

Friday 14<sup>th</sup> September: Galen band performance (in school hall) 9.45am Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> November: Year 1 & 2 Excursion to Fruit Fly Circus and Oddies Park

#### Literacy:

In spelling, the Year 1 students are focusing on the blend 'st' as in 'stop'. Spelling activities in class include brainstorming words, looking at word frames and word searches etc. In writing we are continuing to look at 'Explanations'. This has tied in with our Inquiry topic where we have been explaining the rules of different old-fashioned games.

The Year 2 students are looking at the blend, 'own' as in 'down' for their spelling this week. They have also been discussing the use of prefixes to change the meaning of a word. Students have located words with prefixes in their own texts and have identified the new meaning of the word.

#### Numeracy:

In Year 1, students are continuing to explore, describe and complete simple number patterns. We encourage students to continue skip counting, commencing at various starting points by 2s, 5s, 10s and as they become more confident, 3s.

In Year 2, the students have commenced a new unit on 'Shape' and, in particular, 3D objects and shapes. Students will explore, identify and describe common characteristics of 3D shapes and identify these in shapes in everyday objects.

#### **Religious Education:**

Continuing with the theme of Creation, this week the students listened to Psalm 104 before discussing and illustrating to coincide with its underlying meaning.

#### Inquiry:

This Friday the Year 1s are conducting an expo from 11.30am-12.30pm. We have invited the Year 3/4 students, as well as any parents or friends who would like to come along and join in the fun of learning and playing some old fashion games such as LUDO, Hopscotch, Knuckles and many more.

Next term, as part of our inquiry, 'Places and Spaces,' the students will be going for a learning walk to explore the building and features of our CBD. We would love some parent/friends to join us on this tour. Please let your child's classroom teacher know if you would be available to assist. Please note that a Working with Children Check is required, by law, for all parents on excursions.

#### Missing Glasses:

In the year 3/4 area, a student has misplaced their glasses. The glasses are red, and they are in a black and white case that is similar to a Zebra colouring. If you see or find these glasses, please return them to Mr Levesque.

#### **Religion:**

This week in the unit, 'God's Holy Word', the students are brainstorming - What they know about the Bible? What are the Scriptures? What is the Gospel? Who is in the Bible? Students will look at the Bible and discuss, research and explore the parts, significant people and key events in the Scriptures.

#### Literacy:

#### Writing/Inquiry:

This week in writing students will watch a clip about the arrival of the First Fleet and the perspective of the Indigenous Peoples. Students will compare the information as they have already watched a clip about Indigenous People's perspective. Students will then discuss why the European Settlers decided to pick Australia. What made the Europeans pick Australia?

#### Reading:

This week in reading students will be reading Readers Theatre. Students will be asked to work in small groups and focus on their expression, fluency, pausing and phrasing. Students will record themselves reading in order to help them improve in these areas. Students will then perform to the Foundation children.

#### Spelling:

This week in spelling students are focusing on homographs. Homographs are two or more words spelled the same but not necessarily pronounced the same and having different meanings and origins for example bow and bow, bat and bat.

#### Numeracy:

This week Year three are identifying angles as measures of turn and comparing angle sizes in everyday situations, for example that analogue clocks use the turning of arms to indicate time and comparing the size of angles between the arms for familiar times. Year Four are comparing angles and classifying them as equal to, greater than or less than a right angle.

#### YEAR FIVE/SIX – Nara, Paul, Andrea, Helen, Sharyn & Catherine

#### Literacy:

Students are continuing to engage in Literacy Circles and this week's focus is 'Text Connector'.

- Text-Text-: The War on Waste articles and videos they have watched and read asks the students to make similar connections:
- Text-Self-: Experiences in Canberra, The student's own opinion of the environment.
- Text-World-: How this segment relates to the environmental and energy issues being faced world-wide.

Students have also selected interesting passages from their Literacy Circle texts and have had to explain their reasoning for selecting this passage. Please continue to read with, and also encourage your child to read independently at home each night. You might also like to select interesting passages of text to discuss with your child.

In Writing, we are focusing on our Canberra trip and creating a slide show of our time away in Canberra. This will be shared on your child's Seesaw page so look out for it next week.

#### Numeracy:

Students are investigating mapping and grid coordinates in numeracy this week as well as learning about the Cartesian coordinate system.

#### **Religious Education:**

This week students are commencing a new unit of work which is called 'The Church in Australia'. During this unit students will identify the men and women who, with the help of the Holy Spirit, shaped and inspired the development of the Australian Catholic Church. They will also recount the story of one significant Australian Catholic, exploring how their faith enabled them to carry out their mission.

#### Social Emotional Learning (Rights, Responsibilities and Respectful Relationships):

This week we will be looking at the Topic 'Help Seeking'. The students will identify types of problems that they would seek independently, types of problems where they can benefit from seeking help from their peers and types of problems where they can benefit from seeking help from adults.

#### Homework:

Homework is due in this week either on Thursday 13th September or Friday 14th September.

#### Uniform:

There have been a number of students out of uniform this week. Please ensure your child is wearing the appropriate uniform to school. If there is a reason they are not wearing the correct uniform, please send a note to your child's teacher.

### SEASONS FOR GROWTH

Seasons for Growth is a small group loss and grief education program. The Children and Young People's Program strengthens the social and emotional wellbeing of children and young people (aged 6 -18) who are dealing with significant loss or change. This may include the death of a loved one, parental divorce or separation, the experience and aftermath of natural disaster, moving house or school, as well as many other life changes and losses.

Small groups of 4-7 children work with a trained adult Companion (facilitator) who supports the children in learning new ways to share, think about and respond to the changes and losses in their lives. Children learn that they are not alone in dealing with the effects of change, loss and grief. They build their understanding and communication, decision making and problem-solving skills as part of a supportive peer group.

The Seasons for Growth Children and Young People's Program takes place over a structured eight-week period filled with peer-to-peer learning opportunities - with time to talk and listen as well as take part in activities including drawing, music, art, journaling, roleplays and storytelling. A celebration session and two follow up 'reconnector' sessions complete the program, and each session explores an age appropriate concept, for example "Change is a part of life" and "Caring for my feelings". The story of the seasons is used to explain the cycles of life, including change and loss, and provides a valuable metaphor for children to explore and understand their own story.
