## Health Requirements

Just a reminder that, if your child is unwell (cough, fever, runny nose etc), then they must stay away from school until recovered. If you are unsure of their condition, then please seek medical advice. Here is the medical advice that I have received from the Department of Education:

MANAGING ILLNESS IN SCHOOLS AND EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES DURING THE CORONAVIRUS (COVID - 19) PANDEMIC

One of the most important things we can do to slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) in our community is to stay at home when we are unwell, even when we have the mildest of symptoms.

What you need to know:

If a child becomes unwell during the day, they must be collected from school/early childhood education and care (ECEC) as soon as possible.

- 2. If a child has any of the symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) outlined below, however mild, they should get tested and they must remain at home until they receive their results:
- fever
- · chills or sweats
- cough
- sore throat
- · shortness of breath
- · runny nose
- loss of sense of smell or taste.

In certain circumstances headache, muscle soreness, stuffy nose, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea may also be considered symptoms.

#### **Literacy focus**

- Writing this week's writing is coming from a selection of independent reading texts e.g. book reports
- Spelling this week's focus words are coming from our own writing. Students are encouraged to select 5-10 words they didn't get quite right in their writing and then practise these throughout the week using the activities suggested on Seesaw.

## **Numeracy focus**

• This week our focus has been on 'Time'. We encourage families to incidentally refer to the time e.g. what time is it? how long until? how long did that activity take? over the holidays. Lots of repetition will assist students in consolidating their understanding of time, particularly in telling the time using analogues clocks.

### **Inquiry focus**

• This week our inquiry focus comes to an end. We have thoroughly enjoyed learning about how things have changed through the generations and also pondering what things may look like in the future.

#### **Religion focus**

•This week our religion focus (Baptism) comes to an end. We have thoroughly enjoyed learning about what is Baptism and the signs and symbols associated with this Sacrament.

• For 4R's this week we are encouraging students to post a photo of something that makes them happy! As a family you might like to share what makes each of you feel happy and see whether or not the activities are similar or different.

What a journey!! It is hard to believe the end of term is here. Many thanks to all of our parents and students for the amazing effort you have been putting into our Remote Learning program. We continue to be impressed by the wonderful work that is being submitted.

We would also like to congratulate the Year 4 students who entered the Victorian Maths Talent Quest. They have done amazingly well in achieving 'High Distinction' and were chosen for the National Maths Talent Quest! Also, a big thankyou to Grace Patterson for all the time and effort she has put into planning and helping the children.

#### **Dates to Remember:**

Friday 18th September: Term 3 ends at 2.30pm

Monday 5th October: Children return Week 1, Term 4

**Reading:** This week the students continue with their routine of working on a variety of reading and comprehension tasks using platforms such as:

- Reading Eggspress: assigned books
- Kids News: 'World's loneliest elephant free to find friends' OR 'Time outdoors is good medicine for hi-tech kids'
- Tim Faulkner's Animal Tales: The Manning River Turtle
- Reflecting and Responding Activity Cards.

**Writing**: This week, the students are writing an autobiography about themselves. In Google Slides they will follow the steps outlined and look at the examples to guide their writing. We look forward to reading them!!

**Spelling**: Each week the students are completing a variety of activities such as word sorting, breaking words into phonemes and creating sentences. They are also completing Reading Eggspress Spelling tasks related to the focus sound. During the course of the week students are also completing an editing task in which they are challenged to find and correct errors in a piece of writing. This week:

Spelling – 'f as in fish'; 'ff' as in coffee; 'ph as in dolphin'; 'gh' as in enough Editing – A Fire in an Igloo?

**Maths**: This week, the students continue to explore and learn about different 'Mental and Written Subtraction Strategies'. Each day students are completing tasks from Studyladder as well as workbook activities that are focused on assisting them to develop efficient strategies so as to confidently complete subtraction equations and algorithms.

**Religious Education:** This week, the students have watched and reflected on a video about climate change. They then chose an organisation in society that cares for God's creation - our world (e.g. Earthcare, Planet Ark, etc). Students researched about their chosen organisation and wrote interesting facts about how it contributes to saving our planet.

#### **Mathematics**

This week we continue our unit on Time. The students are working on a prior to and during COVID timetable and making observations about time using both 12 and 24hr time recordings. They have also made comparisons of their Green Time Vs Screen Time pre and during COVID.

#### Literacy

The focus in Literacy during remote learning is the continuing reading comprehension skills through literacy circles, kid's news tasks and the students listening to a number of podcasts related to our Inquiry topic of Democracy. In writing, the students have been researching our Zoom visitors Nova Peris, Dane Pineau and Nick Morris and writing open ended interview questions to ask.

#### RE

We continue to celebrate the Season of Creation through morning prayers and Harvest Liturgies and connection to Creation activities.

#### **Zoom Visitors**

This week the senior students have been treated to some famous visitors - Olympic and Commonwealth Games gold medallist OAM Nova Peris, South East Melbourne NBL basketballer Dane Pineau and OAM Paralympic gold medallist Nick Morris who will be 'visiting' the students in November. What a treat! The key message that we all took inspiration from was that "nothing is impossible" and the importance of the "power of education and hard work". We are super lucky to have had these opportunities, and sincerely thank the visitors for their time.

What is the Maths Talent Quest? First held in 1982, the Maths Talent Quest (MTQ) is an annual activity organised by The Mathematical Association of Victoria (MAV). Looking at real life situations and finding that mathematics is everywhere helps capture the imagination of both teachers and students alike. The Maths Talent Quest allows students to investigate mathematics on an individual, group or class basis with the opportunity to have fun exploring mathematics in real life situations.

The Maths Talent Quest engages students in mathematics project work and investigations, as well as providing them with an opportunity to use ICT and communicate to their peers, and a state-wide and national audience. In addition, participating in the MTQ rewards student's efforts.

## YEAR 4 INDIVIDUAL ENTRY: Rosie's Walk by Pippa O'Connor

Our family got our first puppy, a Maltese-Toy Poodle at the end of March. Pippa decided to guess how long it would take Rosie to be able to walk 1.5 km in under 15 minutes. Pippa's estimate was 6 weeks. Pippa tested her hypothesis by timing how far Rosie walked in 15 minutes each day. She recorded her data on a spreadsheet, logging in the distance walked each day, whether she had a leash and Rosie's weight and height weekly. At week 5 Rosie met the target of walking 1.5 km in 15

minutes. Pippa concluded that Rosie walked faster without a leash and as she gained weight and height, she was able to walk further faster. Although Pippa's original hypothesis of 6 weeks was disproven, she was able to draw conclusions from her data by calculating averages of distance and total distance covered.

## YEAR 4 INDIVIDUAL ENTRY - Supercars by Cooper Cassidy

I chose this topic because I enjoy watching the supercars both in person and on television. For this investigation I focused my efforts on researching and compiling data on the top 3 drivers in the 2019 supercar championship.

The aim of the investigation is to see: Who received the most pole positions, who won the most races, who completed the most race laps and to see how far the V8 Supercars travelled in 2019.

I contacted BJR racing who are a local supercar team who provided me with some data. The most interesting fact that I found was that Scott McLaughlin, who won the championship, did the least number of laps in the top 3 in the championship, I was really surprised by this! Throughout this investigation I enjoyed learning how

to create graphs and formulas e.g. SUM, MULTIPLY, COUNT and COUNTIF. This investigation has helped me to learn more about how the championship works, whilst having fun and challenging my learning at the same time.



#### YEAR I GROUP ENTRY- Missing Teeth

## Isabella Huhn, Rafferty Lister, Zoe Thompson and Alex Tekesic

We investigated the question: Does your age affect how many teeth you have lost?

We thought this topic would be interesting to research because everyone loses teeth! But we don't know why we lose teeth. We surveyed 10 students from each age group at school to see how many teeth they had lost and then analysed the results. We found out that the older you are the more likely you are to have lost many or all of your teeth, and that your age does affect the number of teeth lost.

We investigated the question: How does air pressure affect the distance a paper rocket travels?

We had great fun borrowing Ms Pallot's rocket launcher to measure the distance a paper rocket flew as we increased the air pressure measured in PSI. After analysing our measurements, we concluded that air pressure does affect how far the rocket travelled: 30 PSI travelling the furthest in a single trial, however 20 PSI travelling the furthest consistently over three trials.
