ST PATRICK'S DAY



"Top of the mornin' to ya, and the rest of the day to yourself". I just love silly Irish sayings! It's probably got something to do with being a "Corrigan" with bog Irish ancestry.

When we speak about Ireland, we can't help to associate the name of St Patrick to it. The story of St Patrick is a remarkable story.

Born in Roman Britain in the late 4th century, he was kidnapped at the age of 16 and taken to Ireland as a slave. He escaped but returned about 432 to convert the Irish to Christianity. By the time of his death on March 17, 461, he had established monasteries, churches, and schools. Many legends grew up around him — for example, that he drove the snakes out of Ireland and used the shamrock to explain the Trinity. Ireland came to celebrate his day with religious services and feasts.

In the nearly sixteen hundred years since his death, there have been many stories and legends grown up about St Patrick. To me though, the important thing about St Patrick was the man that he grew to become. After facing the cruelty and deprivations of slavery, he not only forgave his captors, he also presented a way of unifying a country using Christian values. His kindness, patience, care for others and his devotion to God through his every action is what sets him apart from others to give him the Saintly recognition that he deserves.

If we can instill the values of care for ourselves, others and our world in our children, then we have succeeded in carrying on the great work of St Patrick, one thousand six hundred years after it began.

Confirmation and Eucharist - This weekend

The Sacraments will be celebrated this weekend the 20th and 21st March for the students who missed out last year.

It will be exciting welcoming Bishop Shane to officiate at these ceremonies. There will be a practice session tomorrow night, Thursday, 18th March. These practices will be staggered to allow for the COVID regulations.

They are as follows:

- * If your child is celebrating the Sacraments at <u>11.00am on Sunday at Our Lady's Church</u>, then practice is at **7.00pm at Our Lady's Church**.

A second celebration of these Sacraments is set down for 28th & 29th August for children who would normally be celebrating the Sacraments this year. More on that later.


Pancake Breakfast and Caritas K's

Chatter Matters

Share books with your child by reading and asking questions. This will help your child hear the entire sequence and flow of the story, which will assist them learning story structure. Once your child has had the opportunity to have a few texts read to them uninterrupted, it is important that during reading, you begin to take turns in talking about what is happening in the pictures and ask your child questions that focus on the elements of the story.

Before reading a story with your child discuss the following questions:

What is the title of the book?

What does the cover tell you about the book?

What do you think the book is about?

Have we read a book like this before?

During reading with your child, the following questions can be asked:

What do you think will happen next?

What is the problem in the book?

How do you think the problem will be solved?

Why do you think the character did that?

How do you think the character feels?

When you were reading this part, what were you picturing in your head?

After reading ask the following questions:

Describe the setting of the story?

Where did the story take place?

What was your favourite part?

Which part would you change?

Well the weeks are certainly flying by and the students are working beautifully in their classrooms.

Today we celebrated St Patrick's Day. The children have had a wonderful day learning all about St Patrick, with a liturgy this morning, cake this afternoon and some Irish dancing!

MORNING ARRIVAL: This week, once the children have unpacked their items (fruit, water, reader folder (Mondays) they will now be encouraged to play in the 'big' yard in the mornings before 9.00am, where the supervising teacher is, rather than in the classroom. Could we also ask that students arrive at school by 8:50 at the latest, to allow the students time to independently unpack their bag etc and have a play in the yard before lining up to commence our day. Your support in this is greatly appreciated.

SCHOOL NURSING PROGRAM FORMS: Please bring them into school ASAP if you haven't already done so.

MONDAY: Every Monday the students are to bring their yellow reading diaries to school please. Books create warm emotional bonds between adults and kids when they read books together. Books help kids develop basic language skills and profoundly expand their vocabularies—much more than any other media. Books are interactive; they demand that kids think. ... They give us new ways to think and new ideas.

CURRICULUM

Religion: We continue our unit, 'Lent and Easter'. The students have been discussing different ways in how they can 'Be More' in their own lives. They have drawn and written about their own Lenten promises in ways they can help others.

We have also been sharing stories from the Project Compassion 'BE MORE, Caritas organisation. This week we shared the story of Olivia from Tanzania. Click on the link to view - https://lent.caritas.org.au/week-3

Literacy: Big Books: Patterson - 'Dan the Flying Man', Shaw - 'Brown Bear Brown Bear'. The students are quickly recognising the repetition in our weekly big books. They are also learning to identify 'who', 'what', 'where' and 'what doing' from the story. The students will continue to learn what makes up a sentence, where to start reading and keeping track with our eyes as we read. The students will continue to participate in our daily Heggerty program. This looks at all aspects relating to phonemic awareness. You may see your child say; 'thumbs up or thumbs down' for rhyming words, or 'get your choppers' out for syllables and to hear the final phoneme in a word we 'punch it out'.

During writing, the students will continue to observe explicit writing instruction lessons on how to begin the writing process. They will continue to learn to 'write' and draw a message for others to read. They are focusing on, 'I can write down what I hear' with a particular focus on hearing and recording the initial (first) and final (last) sound in word as we write them down. The children are enjoying learning that a sentence is made up of words and has spaces after each word. You might notice your child mentioning different punctuation symbols too!

Ipads - PM Reading App: We will be sending home, your child's log in details soon, if you wish to access this at home. More details on how to access this will be sent home in the reader folders.

Mathematics: Our topic is 'Length'. Students will be comparing objects directly, by placing one object against another to determine which is longer or by pouring from one container into the other to see which one holds more. They will be using suitable language associated with measurement attributes, longer, shorter, compare, length, taller, smaller, long, less, more, tall, smaller, longest, shortest. Along with this unit on length, we still do our regular daily counting and number related tasks.

Inquiry (MAPPEN): This week we began our unit 'Shaping Identity'. Students will learn about the identity of other students in the class as they create pictographs. The students will learn how to get help in the classroom and in the schoolyard and how to use objects safely. By considering what they like and learning ways of expressing what they like, students will be better able to set and reach new goals.

Essential questions

What is my identity?
What is the classroom identity? How should I ask for help?
Who should I ask for help?
How do I stay safe and healthy?

4R's Program (Rights, Resilience and Respectful Relationships): Our topic this term is Emotional Literacy. At the end of this unit students will learn to; recognise and identify their own emotions and describe situations that may evoke these emotions.

YEAR ONE/TWO – Karen, Caz & Sarah

Welcome to week 8 and another exciting week of learning and celebrations.

HAPPY ST PATRICK'S DAY

Today the students enjoyed wearing green and of course, eating green cupcakes. They learnt more about St Patrick today and the importance of the shamrock.

This week's learning focus -

Religion - The students will continue to view the Caritas stories and link the life of Jesus into our lives. Lent is a time of reflection and how we can share, help, be brave and be thankful. Thank you again for your support in encouraging your child to help around the house and in doing so, contributing to our classroom Caritas collection boxes. This links so well with the Caritas theme of 'Be more'.

Literacy - The students will continue the program working as a whole and small groups and complete individual learning tasks. We have been impressed with the number of nights the children have been reading and thank you for your valuable comments which help us to assist your child's reading. Our spelling focus this week is the 'er' sound, such as 'er' in 'fern', 'ir' in 'bird', 'or' in 'worm' and 'ur' in 'fur'. The students are focussing on how the same sound can be made by different letter combinations. During writing, the students will continue to focus on looking at different text types such as their features and purpose. Students will continue to discuss the role of different punctuation marks and the importance of using complex sentences to convey our ideas.

THANK YOU GLOW DAY SPA FOR SUPPORTING OUR SCHOOL

Mathematics - The students will explore 'place value' through ordering numbers, naming numbers before and after specific numbers, looking at horizontal and vertical patterns and making specific numbers. The students will use a variety of materials such as 'bundles' of tens and 'MAB blocks to create numbers'. Students will focus on how numbers can be represented differently such as 127 is 100 + 20 +7. This will then assist with further mathematical equations and situations such as addition and subtraction. Correctly naming and writing numbers is a continued focus. I wonder if you know what the largest number of digits your child can read or write? You might like to investigate this with your child.

Rotations -

<u>Inquiry</u> - Students will discuss and look at the stages of life ahead of them such as 'What they are looking forward to' and 'What they want to know about growing older'. Your child may come home and want to ask you about the things you remember during the different stages of your life.

<u>4R's</u> - Students will identify emotions in others and empathise with others. Students will suggest ways to help others by using the class bear, 'Circles'.

<u>Technology</u> - Students will further develop their iPad skills, knowledge and discuss how they use an iPad correctly and safely.

Literacy:

During **Reading** sessions students are continuing to explore a variety of fiction and non-fiction text types through a range of literary sources, including online the Kids News and Reading Eggspress websites. We have been exploring and contextualising subject-specific vocabulary as well as interpreting and responding to the information presented. Students are learning to think 'within', 'beyond' and 'about' the text, using different systems to process text.

In **Writing**, students are on their way to finalising their narrative writing pieces. They are reviewing and editing their work to correct any missing punctuation and ensure their writing has a clear storyline which makes logical links between the different stages of their stories - the sizzling start, the backfill of their characters and their settings, the build up to the character's problem, the solutions to their problems, and the conclusion to their stories. Students will then be ready to publish their work in a Google Doc within the Google Classroom platform and navigate the typing, editing and formatting process of their stories, online.

Our **Spelling** this week focuses on the phoneme '-oo' as in cook, '-u' as in bull. We are also revising the range of suffixes we have looked at throughout the term.

Numeracy:

This week in Numeracy the students have turned their focus towards the renaming of numbers into different place values. Students have worked through different tasks and games, using a variety of concrete materials, including MAB blocks, to become more familiar with renaming. Renaming requires students to think about how amounts can be represented in different ways by breaking down or building up in different place values. For example, 350 can be renamed as 350 ones, or as 3 hundreds and 5 tens, or as 35 tens or even 25 tens and 1 hundred. Some of the 3/4 classes are also working on observing patterns when adding and subtracting 10, 100 and 1 000.

Homework:

Every week the Year 3/4 homework requirement involves reading each evening and recording a summary of the text on the reading log sheet, which is stuck in the homework book. This week, students have a Place Value game to play with family members. The game is called "Calculate-a-Digit". The rules of this game are glued into the homework book. The game requires a deck of cards with the tens and picture cards removed, as well as a calculator.

**Please ensure that your child puts their homework book into their bags on Thursday night, for submission on Friday morning.

Religious Education:

This week the students are continuing our unit, 'Easter – New Life'. In this unit, students will be given the opportunity to discover ways to use their gifts and talents to help others during Lent, in preparation for Easter. They will also explore experiences of 'death' and 'new life' in their lives and how this is related to the Church's celebration of the Easter season.

BE PERSISTENT, LEARN TOGETHER



Maths can, and should be, really fun!



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


