

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

FOUNDATION - Caz, Karen & Trish

Wow! What a colourful Sunday we had at the 'Colour Run'. It was wonderful to see the happy and smiling faces of all who participated - great job everyone!

Thank you to the parents who attended the Parent/Teacher Interviews last week. It was rewarding to share your child's progress that they have made throughout the year.

Last Friday, we were fortunate enough to have Jenny from Life Saving Australia speak to us about water safety. It was very informative and certainly highlighted the many dangers we need to be aware of in and around the water. A clear message that we learnt about was that we need to dial triple **000** for help. Please have a discussion with your child about the importance of knowing this number.

Today was Transition day for the 2019 Foundation students, so once again your children were divided between Mrs Bray's class and the year one and two classes for an hour and a half in the morning.

Religion

We continue to explore the unit, 'I Am Special So Are You'. This week, the students will continue to create class books that will share the special gifts each and every child share with others. They will write and draw a response about each student and when finished this will be a keepsake to take home.

Literacy -

We continue to explore Fairy Tales. How marvellous to share these 'old classics' with the students. The students are becoming aware of the different language used when listening to fairy tales. The rich and beautiful language used is often wonderful for wonderings and brushing up on oral language skills.

This week, the Foundation classes will focus on: -

Foundation Shaw - Three Little Pigs

Foundation Bray - Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs

Foundation Levesque - The Elves and the Shoemaker

Mathematics

This week, the students will focus on comparing objects directly, by placing one object against another to determine which is longer or by pouring from one container into the other to see which one holds more using suitable language associated with measurement attributes, such as 'tall' and 'taller', 'heavy' and 'heavier', 'holds more' and 'holds less'.

Inquiry

As a part of our unit 'Great and Small', the students will consider how places change and how we need to adapt to these changes. Through time lapse videos, the students will view the changes that occur in the life of a monarch caterpillar such as: chewing a hole in the egg, wiggling out of the egg, eating leaves to get bigger and becoming a caterpillar.

The students will be asked to consider what they might see during each season. They will link the seasons to changes in animals and consider what they are differently.

YEAR ONE/TWO - Janina, Amanda, David, Fran & Erin

Another week has passed, and we have had so many wonderful experiences in the One/Two area. Our excursion to Albury to the Fruit Fly Circus was a huge success. The children were taught circus skills and gained a great insight into the life of a 'Circus Performer'. The other part of our day in Albury was spent at Oddies Playground, a fantastic experience for all of the children as it offered so many different playground activities. We are sure there were some very tired children on Wednesday night! Once again, our children made us very proud with their outstanding behaviour, it was a pleasure to take them to Albury.

Unfortunately, Planet Rhythm didn't go ahead on Thursday as the performer, John was unwell, but we are hoping that he may be able to reschedule for another time to come to St Patrick's and perform.

LITERACY

Year One

Reading: We are looking at Predicting as a strategy to develop comprehension when reading. Again, we will practise this skill using a variety of great picture story books.

Writing: We are continuing to look at Persuasive writing and the different forms it can take. The children will have an opportunity to express an opinion and do their best to persuade others through their persuasive writing pieces.

Spelling: We are revising some of the sound blends that we have looked at throughout the year in order to consolidate our knowledge and understanding.

Year Two

Reading: An emphasis on fluency continues. A further focus continues on summarising to help the children comprehend what they have read.

Writing: We will continue looking at Explanation text? An explanation text tells your audience how something works or why something happens. Explanations detail and logically describe the stages in a process, such as the water cycle, or how a steam engine works. ... Factorial and consequential explanations explain effects and outcomes of processes.

Handwriting we are revising the correct formation of letter 'Hh'.

Spelling: We are looking at 'wh' words as in 'whale' and 'what' and looking at these words within our everyday reading.

MATHS

Year One - Over the next two weeks in Numeracy we will be looking at Money and Financial Mathematics. The children will recognise, describe and order Australian coins according to their value. They will also skip count by fives and tens starting from zero as they learn to count money. Please use any opportunity during the course of the day to talk to your children about money and allow them when possible to be involved in tasks that involve handling money, particularly coins, enabling them to connect what they have learnt to 'real life' situations. The children are really enjoying playing 'money games' and hopefully will have an opportunity to share their knowledge with you when you next go to the shops!

Year Two - We are continuing with recognising, counting and ordering small collections of Australian coins and notes according to their value. There is still an emphasis on identifying whether an amount of money is in dollars or cents in order to understand its value. Simple comparison activities will allow students to routinely think about relative values: Which is more: 5c or \$5.00? Which is more: 20c or \$5.00?

RELIGION

We continue our Unit of work on Advent - "Getting Ready for Jesus". We discuss that Advent is a time to prepare for Christmas and that God promised us a Saviour. During the time of Advent, we prepare for Jesus to come into our lives in a special way. One way of 'living our faith' is by bringing in items for the St Vincent de Paul Christmas hamper appeal. The Year One children have been asked to bring in biscuits (tins, packets or boxes) and the Year Two children are responsible for donating Candy Canes.

Religious Education:

This week the students continue to explore the Scripture stories 'The Prodigal Son' and 'Zacchaeus'. After reading and watching re-enactments of the stories, the students are creating comic strips of six key events that happened and relating them to the four steps of Reconciliation – Admit, Say Sorry, Forgive, Reconcile.

Literacy:

Reading

This week we continue focusing on inferencing (reading between the lines) using different media. The students read or listen to a story/video clip/picture, looking for key words or clues that help answer questions or wonderings.

Writing:

This week in writing, each class is completing their camp information report on Harrietville and presenting it as a brochure or document. The students will also review the layout of an information report and use this as a guide to complete their reports. The students are also honing in on their editing skills using a checklist – capital letters, punctuation, tenses, spelling.

Spelling:

This week in spelling we are continuing with 'ght' as in caught and how we use them in the past, present and future tenses - I *caught* the bus to school; I am *catching* the bus to school; I *will catch* the bus to school. The students are also completing set tasks about tenses and 'ght' on Reading Eggspress and Studyladder.

Numeracy:

Over the next few weeks we are extending our understanding and revising different strands of

numeracy and the strategies we use. Following on from fractions the students are looking at how fractions relate to decimals; revisiting multi-step problems using division and multiplication; and measuring, ordering and comparing objects using common units of length, mass, capacity and temperature.

Inquiry:

This week in Inquiry, the students are exploring, experimenting and investigating solids and liquids and how adding and removing heat can change these properties. They will consider where in nature they have seen water melt or freeze and places on Earth where changes in temperature cause water to change from liquid to solid and solid to liquid and climate change e.g. Kiribati.

Just a thought: as there is a change in this term's timetable, it might be a good idea to pack an extra piece of fruit or sandwich!!

YEAR FIVE/SIX - Nara, Paul, Andrea, Helen, Sharyn

Literacy

In Reading this week students are continuing to learn to think critically about different types of text. They are using a variety of non-fiction texts to develop an understanding of the different genres and special forms within the larger category of non-fiction texts. Students are also learning how to express their reasoning relative to a writer's purpose in selecting a particular genre, topic, subject or type of narrative structure.

In Writing, students are learning about descriptive writing and are writing reports to share with their peers.

Numeracy

Over the course of the next week we will be developing our understanding of angles. Students will learn to:

- identify the size of a right angle as 90° and define acute, obtuse, straight and reflex angles
- measure, estimate and compare angles in degrees and classify angles according to their sizes
- recognise and use alternate conventions for naming angles

Religious Education

Students are completing the unit, 'Discovering Our Christian Heritage'. They are exploring Christianity in the context of its origins in Judaism and comparing the similarities and differences with other world religions. Students will be guided to develop an awareness of the rituals and symbols, customs and practices of the world's three monotheistic faiths – Christianity, Judaism and Islam, and understand that there are strong links among the basic beliefs of each faith.

Social Emotional Learning (Rights, Responsibilities and Respectful Relationships)

We are currently focusing on 'Gender and Identity'. The students will '...analyse the impact of peer and adult actions in maintaining or changing contemporary gender norms; develop an awareness of the impact of gender norms on the attitudes and behaviours of those entering adolescence; identify the standards and associated actions that underpin respectful gender relations.' (Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships p. 64) This week students will specifically focus on the topic, 'Born or Made? Thinking About Gender'. Students will be required to think about and describe the way in which gender influences how people relate to young children.

Swimming for the Year 3-6's is continuing this week. Each class will have a 45min lesson every day. The following is a timetable for the day.



AGM report, Kristen Park:

2018 has been a wonderful year for the St Patrick's P&F. I see the P&F's work as one of the cogs that contributes to the overall functioning of the school, bringing together families, school and community and assisting to make St. Patrick's the wonderful place it is. The breakdown of the P&F income and expenditure for the previous few years was unable to be obtained, and therefore figures are not presented in this report.
