Love and hate!

Hate is such a strong word and it gets thrown around like "sugar on a donut!" I hate avocados and zucchinis! I hate rude people. I hate people who tell lies! I hate the Carlton Football Club! (I don't really, just going for the shock factor! LOL).

I could go on and on, but you see where I'm coming from. The reality is that I don't hate any of these things. I may dislike them. I may choose not to have anything to do with them (especially Carlton!). But I don't hate them.

As I've gotten older, I come to realise that hatred is an all-consuming thing. If we hate, we wish the worst for whatever it is that we hate. We wish them dead, gone, eradicated. It eats away at our very being.

I suppose if I were to think of one person who hated like this, it would probably be Adolph Hitler. When you think of the genocide of Jews, people of non-Aryan race and the handicapped that were killed on his orders, then all that I can see is Hitler's hatred for whatever didn't fit into his perceived perfect world. I also believe that he was a "sandwich short of a picnic basket!"

On the other hand, if we look at God's message of love, then love really does conquer all. Even the model of Jesus showed us that love was stronger than hatred. He didn't even hate the accusers who crucified him.

A few years ago, I was lucky enough to listen to Michael Himes, a world-renowned theologian. He spoke to the group about the love of God. A love that is unconditional, that doesn't judge. A love that, at its centre, is pure and uncompromising. To catch Michael out, one of the students asked if God loved Hitler. Michael's response was, "Yes! Absolutely", because God's love comes without conditions. It loves us for us. It is often described as similar to a mother's or father's love for their child. I "get that" as I couldn't love my beautiful son any more or any less than I already do.

During this time of Lent, we should be making efforts to show love to others. For school, that could look like raising money for those in need. For us, it could be mending a friendship, showing compassion and understanding towards others. The things that make the world a better place.

Mobile Phones and Smart Watches

We are currently reviewing our Mobile phone and smart watches policy as there seems to be an upturn in the number of students accessing this technology at school.

NO student is permitted to use a mobile phone, or an associated smart watch, at school. This is because it is too difficult for teachers to gauge the content and the implications for misuse are quite high.

I realise that some parents like to have their children to have a phone, especially bus students who can potentially be left at a bus stop unsupervised. However, whilst at school, phones need to be given to the classroom teacher who will put them in a lockable box for the day. They can be collected at the end of the day.

<u>I am banning smartwatches</u> for the moment as we come to terms with this technology as many teachers recount students being distracted by their smartwatches and not focussing on their schoolwork. The simplest way to remedy this is not to have them at school. It also nullifies students accessing their phones at school via their smart watches.

There will be more on this later. In the meantime, I would be grateful if you can speak with your child as any transgressions will result in a mobile phone ban for the offending student.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

FOUNDATION – Trish & Grace

Week 5 is here already, and the students are quite settled considering the short closure. We will continue to introduce new daily tasks, and the importance of smooth transitions between these, with explicit instructions and expectations. This is to ensure we can begin to implement our small group focus groups knowing the children will be aware of what's expected of them.

MONDAY: Every Monday the students are to bring their yellow reading diaries to school please. On Mondays, the students will exchange their readers for new ones.

Thank you for your cooperation in this matter. Your support with the home reading routine is so important in establishing early reading behaviours in your children.

Green Reader bags: These are to come to school every day. Please take out any work that comes home to ensure these are kept in an organised way. Maybe you've got a special place to display these or a special book to paste them into.

Show and Tell: Please ensure your child brings in something that is related to the weekly topic.

Birthday Cakes: Could we please ask that birthday cakes or treats are not sent to school as we have students in our level with allergies. We thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

CURRICULUM

Religion: We continue our unit, 'What do we know about Jesus?' by reading stories about his life as a young boy and man. Everyday the students are encouraged to name the 'Bible' as a special book that tells us about Jesus' life. The students are making their own Bible with stories of Jesus' life in it

Literacy: Big Books – Paterson - 'Hungry Giant' - Shaw - 'Dan the Flying Man'.

The students will continue to enjoy listening and reading the big books each day. The students will focus on looking at the pictures to help them read as well as what makes up a sentence, where to start reading and keeping track with our eyes as we read. The students will focus on rhyming words as well as using the first letter to help us solve a word in the sentence. They will be prompted to check; Does it look right? Does that sound right? They will also be working out how many syllables are in words. How many syllables are in your family names? During writing, the students will begin to 'write' and draw a message for others to read. They will focus on, 'I can write down what I hear.' The children are enjoying learning the site words and are beginning to use these in their writing. I see a... I like to... etc.

Mathematics: Our topic is 'Patterns and Algebra'. The students will continue to observe natural patterns in the world around us. They will create and describe patterns using materials, sounds, movements or drawings. In this unit the students will be extending patterns using materials and drawings to the right and to the left and identifying which part of the pattern is being repeated (happening over and over again).

Inquiry: This week we began our unit 'Bridge and Beyond'. Students will appreciate and investigate the properties of materials of things they use in their lives.

YEAR ONE/TWO – Karen, Caz & Sarah

Once again, we continue to be so proud of the way the students are settling into our classroom routines. We feel very fortunate that last week's lockdown was short, and the students quickly adapted to being back in the classroom. We thank you for all the support you gave to your child during the remote learning, it was exciting to see the various activities completed. Thank you!

This week's focus -

<u>Religion</u> - Through our new unit, 'Lent' we will explore how this is a special time of praying together and sharing what we have. We will encourage the students to think about others and how they can help those in need. In our classrooms we have a Caritas collection box, we are hoping the students may be able to help around at home and receive a small amount of money that could go in this box. Did you know as little as \$5 can help a family to receive a chicken?

<u>Literacy</u> - Through our daily Phonemic program Heggerty, students will continue to explore rhyme recognition, onset and rime, blending, segmenting, deleting and substituting letters to create new words.

During the Literacy block, the students will work in small and focus groups, focusing on reading texts with phrasing and fluency. We are encouraging the students to discuss what they know about texts they are reading as well as making inferences, thinking about the unknown.

Our modelled and independent writing will continue to explore how to use the appropriate punctuation e.g. full stops, question and exclamation marks to signal the end of a sentence.

Thank you for your support with the Home Reading Program, it is great to read your positive and constructive comments about your child's reading. Please remember to send your child's reader bag/folder and record book each day.

Mathematics -

This week the students will explore the language of location to describe and interpret position. This will also include how to give and follow simple directions interpreting maps and the transformation of shapes using turns and flips.

<u>Library</u> –

Each week we would like your child to return their library books. We encourage your child to bring their library bag so they can borrow 2 new books.

Friday rotations -

The students are enjoying working with all the Year 1/2 teachers.

Technology - Mrs Newton - Last week was very exciting as the students were able to explore and use the new iPads. The students will continue to learn to navigate the new iPads.

Inquiry - Mrs Bray - Students will discuss the importance of making healthy choices when growing up. Students will discuss that parents make the choices for them, then, slowly some of the choices become theirs as they grow. The students will learn more about the healthy food groups and discuss how some foods should be eaten more than others.

4R's - Mrs Levesque - Students will focus on reading people's emotions. The students will listen to stories, act out emotions and discuss their own emotions when different situations arise.

YEAR THREE/FOUR - Karen, Nara, Elli & Janina

We are all so pleased that the recent lockdown was brief and successful, allowing our students to return to onsite learning. Many thanks for your support with the home learning packs and assisting your child.

This week we commence our rotations in the 3/4 area, comprising Technology/Maths, Library and RRRR (Resilience, Rights & Respectful Relationship). A reminder that students will be required to bring in an appropriate bag or case to safely transport their library books between school and home.

Our students have recently received their iPads and have enjoyed familiarising themselves with the new technology (including Apple Pencils), as well as becoming aware of their responsibility as safe users. There will be a range of opportunities to incorporate the iPads as part of our learning in the classroom. We are all very excited!

Literacy:

Students continue to practice their editing and sentence skills, identifying errors in grammar, spelling and punctuation. Our writing focus continues to be Narrative text. Through modelling by the teacher, listening to, and reading different types of narratives, students will learn how to plan their ideas and construct a narrative piece of writing. Our spelling this week focuses on the sounds 'ou/ow' as in about/cow and 'i/y' as in tin/pyramid.

Numeracy:

Students have begun focusing on Place Value and in doing so, will learn to recognise, model, represent and order numbers and apply place value to partition, rearrange and regroup numbers. Place Value plays a very important part in understanding the fundamentals of mathematics, as well as being a starting point for the understanding of other base systems.

Homework:

The homework requirement will continue to involve reading each evening and recording in the reading log. This week, students will also be required to complete a Maths task. It is a place value game that can be played individually or, as a family. This task should be pasted into the Homework book.

***Please remind your child to fill in his/her READING LOG which is stuck into their homework book. Students are asked to record a 'short' summary of their reading for Monday-Thursday nights. Please ensure that your child puts their homework book into their bags on Thursday night, for submission on Friday morning.

Religious Education:

After concluding our unit, 'The Circle of Life,' we will commence our new unit this week based around Lent and Easter. For the remainder of the term, the students will be introduced to the period of Lent and Easter as the most important event in the Church year and will be given the opportunity to explore how the community prepares for Easter through prayer, penance and good works. Students will also be encouraged, through the events of Holy Week, to remember and celebrate the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

Inquiry:

In our unit, 'The Game of Life', the students will look at changes in identity. Students will explore how their identity is unique and formed by many things including family and culture. They will also explore other cultures, their celebrations and how important it is to respect them. Students will learn which health messages in the media are safe to trust and how to say no when someone is pressuring them.

It's great to have students back to face to face learning. The start of the year is so important in establishing routines, positive learning habits and for teachers to gain an understanding of the learning needs of their students. Regular school attendance for the whole day is extremely important. If your child is going to be absent, could you please notify their classroom teacher via email or in person.

iPads:

Students are currently completing online e safety modules and gaining certification. The link can be found on your Child's Google Classroom. ALL students will be required to complete a 'test' on how to responsibly use their devices. Students will be awarded with an iPad licence and will be required to follow the negotiated 'rules' or demerit points will be added to their licences. Students will be required to log into the Apple Classroom App at the beginning of each session, an app that allows teachers to monitor usage. With these measures in place, the devices will remain a critical teaching and learning tool within each class.

SeeSaw:

We will continue to use Seesaw in the 5/6 area this year as a platform for homework and sharing work students are proud of. This digital platform is secure and an excellent way of seeing what your child has been up to in class, as well as receiving notifications from your classroom teacher. You will receive details for your child's log in soon. If you're experiencing difficulty signing up, please let your classroom teacher know.

Religion:

This week we begin our Project Compassion Lenten journey. The theme this year is Be More. Encouraging children and families to "aspire not to have more but be more" St Oscar Romero. Students will be completing weekly tasks linked with people living in poverty from around the world. Classes have also enrolled in Virtual Sessions to be held by Caritas. Students are encouraged to donate to the Caritas box in their classrooms.

Maths:

This week in maths we begin a learning sequence around factors, multiples and triangular numbers. Students will engage in many 'number talks' to notice how we all see numbers in a different way. They will be encouraged to look for patterns and begin reasoning about why a pattern may be happening. Questions to encourage critical mathematical thinking... What is the same and different about ...? Sort or organise the following according to ... What follows from this? What do you think will happen next if we do this? What is the pattern here? Are there other examples that fit the rule? Convince me...

We will also be learning about area and perimeter. Useful vocabulary that you can discuss with your child at home to assist your child's understanding of these concepts include: *area, perimeter, meter, meter squared, factor, multiple, triangular.*

Literacy:

All classes are establishing literacy routines that include reading rotations and regular writing processes. Students are beginning to look at their phonics analysis charts and determining areas of need for their learning. For the next couple of weeks, we will be focusing on narratives and fictional text types.

Inquiry:

This week as part of our 'Ethics & Emotions' unit we have been looking into a variety of 'ethical dilemmas' and discussing how our emotions can impact the choices we make. This has tied in nicely with our 4Rs topic looking at positive, negative and mixed emotions.

Homework:

Students have brought home their homework folders. Please read the expectations with your child and ensure they understand what is expected for homework. Homework will be due each FRIDAY.

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CSEF ELIGIBILITY

Below is the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).

Criteria 1 - Eligibility

To be eligible* for the fund, a parent or legal guardian of a student attending a registered Government or nongovernment Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- · on the first day of Term one, or;
- · on the first day of Term two.
- a) Be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, OR
- b) Be a temporary foster parent, and;
- c) Submit an application to the school by the due date.
- * A special consideration eligibility category also exists. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above.

Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and 17 years of age inclusive.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between five and 18 years inclusive.

CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooled, or TAFE.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (27th January 2021) or term two (19th April 2021).

PAYMENT AMOUNTS

CSEF payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- · Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
- · Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly to your child's school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

For ungraded students, the rate payable is determined by the student's date of birth. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Year 7 government school students who are CSEF recipients are also eligible for a uniform voucher. Secondary schools are required to make applications on behalf of parents so please register your interest at the school.

 - If you are claiming as a Foster Parent or a Veteran Affairs Pensioner, you will need to provide a copy of documentation confirming your status as a temporary Foster Parent or provide your Veterans Affairs Pensioner Gold card to the school.
- 2. Complete the STUDENT/S DETAILS section for students at this school.
- 3. Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible. The CSEF program for 2021 closes on 25th June 2021.

CSEF payments cannot be claimed retrospectively for prior years.


