Margie and Darren were interested in their children's education which is why, six and a half years after Luke left the school to move onto Galen, I remember them so well. They are a beautiful family.

Luke was popular with his peers which clearly continued on, given the deep sorrow experienced by the community. I remember him well as a student with a good group of friends. He wasn't the tallest student in his class. However, he did work experience at St Pat's a while ago and I couldn't believe how much he'd grown. Gone was the skinny little "kid" that left primary school and here was a young man well on his way to adulthood. It was great to talk to him and reconnect with what his family were up to since I last saw them.

Luke has gone too soon. I have been praying not only for him but for the family and friends that he has left behind who are hurting so badly. Please keep them in your thoughts and prayers at this sad time.

I wish that we could make things right. To soothe their hurt and make things better. But we can't. The only thing that we can do is pray and support as best we can and trust in God. May he rest in peace.

Rights, Resilience and Respectful Relationships

Help Seeking

Children can experience all kinds of challenges as they grow and develop. The help-seeking behaviours of children are fundamental to their mental health and wellbeing. Encouraging and fostering help-seeking behaviours is one way to improve mental health and wellbeing. It is important to work with students to make sure they are aware of help-seeking avenues and are confident to seek help from an appropriate source when needed.

Activities will assist students to:

- Practise solving simple interpersonal problems
- Identify ways to care for others, including ways of making and keeping friends
- Discuss the importance of seeking help when dealing with problems that are too big to solve alone
- Practise seeking help from adults and peers.

CHATTER MATTERS

Giving and listening to instructions;

One of the most rewarding learning experiences you can have with your child is while playing board or table top games. At least once week ask your child to drag out an old game. Pretend that you've forgotten how to pay the game and encourage your child to give you the instructions. Make sure you follow their instructions exactly as they say them, even if they are wrong. This way the child will realise they haven't given clear instructions and will need to adjust their language accordingly.

Encourage them to use appropriate instructional language for example; turn left at the next traffic lights, drive 2 more blocks then turn right at the post office. They need to include the action word and key words that highlight where to go.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

FOUNDATION - Caz, Karen & Trish

The students came back to third term showing they are ready to continue their learning in full force! Mrs Eefting has settled in very well and Mrs Levesque's children are working really hard. We have heard from Mrs Levesque and she is having a great time. She will return next week.

This term we will have Sport days on Wednesday and Friday as the students will be participating in BLUEARTH this term. These are the days for sport uniform.

Religion

We have started the unit, 'Our Church' and looked at our families and who we belong to. The students have realised they belong to St Patrick's School and have recognised that being part of St Patrick's School makes them a part of the broader parish community.

Literacy

The children will be continuing on with their literacy learning through reading and writing in response to the 'Big Books' in each classroom. They will be sequencing sentences from their books and continuing to respond to different parts of the stories.

The children are looking at different blends at the beginning of words such as; sl, br, sp.

Mathematics

This week we have been looking at ordinal numbers. We have discussed, first, second and third. The students will name the relative position of an object in a small ordered collection (e.g. of toys), using ordinal numbers such as first, second, fifth, eighth, etc. They will also be able to recognise and describe in which order the participants finish a game. Students will recognise that in some activities there may be a single winner, in other activities, recognition may be given to those who come first, second or third.

Inquiry

'Sharing and Caring' is the topic for this term's Inquiry. The students will investigate different groups within our community and how we all play an important role. They have completed activities to show the different groups to which they belong. Please look out for a note which will explain a simple task the students will be doing next week- we ask that your child brings in an object that represents something interesting about your family. Your child will then be given an opportunity to share a short presentation about their family.

Show and Tell

This week- An interesting item found in the environment. Next week- An object that is shaped like a cube

Upcoming Dates

Thursday 2nd August – Year 1&2 visit to Wangaratta Historical Society

Welcome to week two! The students have settled back into routine beautifully and are ready for lots of learning!

A reminder to look for readers at home and return them to school. Some of our reader boxes that were full, are now completely empty. They are expensive to buy and as a result, makes it very difficult for us to replace them. Please have a look around your home and return any readers to school – we will be very appreciative.

Also, a reminder to return outstanding permission notes for our excursion to the Wangaratta Historical Society.

Literacy

In spelling, the Year 1 students are looking at 'ell' as in 'tell' and 'bell'. The Year 2 students are looking at the blend 'cl' as in 'clap' for their spelling. In writing, the Year 1 students will be looking at different types of punctuation such as full stops, question marks and exclamation marks. The Year 2 students are focusing on using paragraphs in their writing to separate ideas and events. Whilst students are reading at home, we encourage parents to stop at various points throughout the text and discuss what has been read. This assists with the skill of comprehension.

Numeracy

In Year 1 this week we are continuing our focus on finding the difference between 2 numbers. We have sent home one of the games we have enjoyed playing to help us practice using strategies to find the difference, such as counting on and counting back. Please come and see us if you would like to have a look at any other games we have been playing to consolidate our learnings.

In Year 2, the students have continued their focus on multiplication and recognising and represent multiplication as repeated addition, groups and arrays. Students are becoming increasingly confident when modelling arrays and writing multiplication sums, to consolidate the concept of multiplication. It is never too early to begin learning times tables and placing a chart on the 'back of the toilet door!!' They are already very capable with skip counting, which will assist with the learning of times tables. We appreciate your support with this at home.

Religious Education

We have commenced our new unit, 'What is Baptism?' Students have discussed the baptismal symbols and their relevance to this special ceremony. Discussions have also focused on the role of families, as well as belonging to the Church family.

YEAR THREE/FOUR – Sarah, James & Karen

Some dates to remember: $6^{th} - 9^{th}$ August Book Fair

Religion:

This week the students will share their understanding about what it means to be a follower of Jesus. They will listen to, read and interpret Gospel stories/parables through echo-mimes and liquid pictures. Students will then investigate suggested parables and how they are relevant to us today.

Literacy:

This term our focus in Literacy is Informational Report texts. Students will be discussing, reading, planning and writing information reports on different topics. This week, the students will create a class anchor chart about the different parts of an informational report text. They will read, discuss and analyse an information report on 'Humpback Whales'. Through modelling by the teacher and reading different types of medium, students will plan and write an information report. We are also starting Literacy Circles. During this time the students select a book to read in groups and after each chapter the group completes a short task about what they have read.

Our spelling focus this week is on plurals. Rule: Add 'es' to nouns ending with s, ss, ch, sh, x and z to make them plural e.g. box – boxes; glass – glasses; atlas – atlases; brush – brushes; church - churches

Numeracy:

This week's unit is about 'Collecting Data'. The students are organising, comparing and interpreting data collected from questions and surveys conducted during class time. The students will construct displays with and without the use of technology, including tables, lists, column graphs and picture graphs.

Inquiry:

This week the students are learning about the cramped conditions on the prison hulks and listening to stories of the First Fleet, including causes and reasons for the journey, who travelled to Australia and some of their experiences on the boat. After creating an outline, on the oval, of the hull of a ship (32 metres long by 8 metres) and dividing it into six equal parts, the students stand altogether in one section of the hull for five minutes. Back in class students reflect on the hardships caused when living in a confined space for a long time.

Parents, could you please ensure your child has the correct jumper/jacket as some children have lost their jumper with a name on it.

YEAR FIVE/SIX – Nara, Paul, Andrea, Helen, Sharyn & Catherine

Literacy:

During Reading sessions this week students are continuing to explore a variety of text types from the Yarning Strong Anthology. This is an indigenous resource comprised of four anthologies which are related to 'Land, Law, Family and Identity'. Following on from whole group reading sessions, the students are working on creating posters, depicting family trees and also recording written responses to text. During focus groups the students have had the opportunity to develop their understanding of Reader's Theatre and how to use their voice to effectively convey the characters in a story. In their Literature Circles they have been introduced to a short novel, once again relating to one of the anthologies. They will be focusing on connecting to concepts in the text, by either making a *text to text, text to self* or *text to world* connection.

In Writing sessions this week, the students are constructing their own biography relative to a wellknown indigenous woman who has made a contribution to Australia in some way. Some of these women are Cathy Freeman, Lowitja O'Donoghue, Evonne Goolagong Cawley, Jessica Mauboy and Christine Anu. Students used a biography organiser template to record their research. This related to where their subject was born, their family life growing up, challenges, achievements, and how they have impacted other people's lives.

Numeracy:

In Numeracy this week, we are continuing to focus on the concept of Division. Students are developing their understanding of written division strategies which will also involve practical, reallife applications. If possible, please take some time to ask your child to explain/show you what they have been doing in class. This is a way of helping them to consolidate their understanding.

AFL 9s: Reminder:

This term Galen VET Sport and Recreation students will once again conduct AFL 9's Clinics for the Year 5 and 6 classes. This will conclude with a carnival where St Pat's students will play the other CREW primary schools. The dates are as follows:

Clinic 1 – Thursday 9th Aug – Denise's class – AFL 9s skills focus – 11.30 – 12.30 pm at St Patrick's

Clinic 2 – Friday 10^{th} Aug – Jennie's class – AFL 9s skills and game focus – 9.15 – 10.30 am – at Galen using ovals for games

Carnival date – Monday 3rd Sept – 11.00 to 2.30 at Galen to play the other CREW Primary Schools.

This week students will be provided with permission notes. Please ensure that they are returned to the classroom teacher as soon as possible.

Maths Closure Day:

Yesterday, Tuesday 24th July, St Pat's teachers participated in an engaging professional development day under the guidance of Dr Duncan Symons from Melbourne University. This focused on an Inquiry-based approach to teaching mathematics which promoted sustained engagement, and opportunities for developing critical and creative reasoning. Duncan highlighted many practical resources and differentiated investigations that we can use with our students.

Religious Education:

In the unit '*Mission- Living and Sharing*', our students will develop an understanding and appreciation of 'mission' and the 'call to mission'. We have begun this unit by identifying the key elements of a 'mission' (e.g. purpose, planning, carrying out the plan, reflecting and celebrating achievement). This will lead into researching the work of a mission organisation in small groups. As part of this, students will explain the purpose of the organisation and how it is continuing the mission of Jesus within a contemporary setting.

Lunar Eclipse- Blood Moon Eclipse

If you are keen to get up early on Saturday 28th July (this weekend) there is going to be a Lunar Eclipse, the longest in the 21st century taking 103 minutes to complete. To ensure you are not standing out in the cold for that long, the times for viewing in Wangaratta are as follows:

Partial begins: 28 Jul, 04:24:27 Full begins: 28 Jul, 05:30:15 Maximum: 28 Jul, 06:21:44

Total lunar eclipses are also sometimes called Blood Moons because of the Moon's reddish-orange appearance.

On the day of the eclipse, the Full Moon is also at its farthest from the Earth, so it will look smaller in the sky than usual (although this may be hard to tell!).

Don't forget to look for Mars as well, which is very close to the eclipsed Moon and is easy to see with the naked eye, <u>weather</u> permitting.

Unlike a Solar Eclipse, a Lunar Eclipse is safe to view with the naked eye. For more information below is the link to an article about the Eclipse this weekend:

Parents who previously claimed lump sum payments

If you haven't already done so, please ensure your families are aware that the new Child Care Subsidy cannot be claimed as a lump sum at the end of the 2018-19 financial year.

If families who claimed Child Care Benefit or Child Care Rebate as a lump sum in the past still have child/ren attending child care, they will need to submit a new claim for Child Care Subsidy as soon as possible to avoid paying full fees. Families should sign into their Centrelink online account through <u>myGov</u> and complete a Child Care Subsidy claim.

Centrelink can backdate payments for care provided up to 28 days before the date the family submitted their claim.

Families can still submit a lump sum claim for Child Care Benefit or Child Care Rebate for any approved child care used in the 2017-18 financial year. These claims need to be submitted by 30 June 2019.

When subsidy may be paid directly to parents

While Child Care Subsidy/Additional Child Care Subsidy (CCS/ACCS) is generally paid to providers to pass on to parents as a fee reduction, it may need to be paid directly to parents in some specific scenarios, particularly where there is a change in circumstances *after* session reports have been submitted. For example:

- A service submits a child's session report for a fortnight containing 32 hours of care, even though the parent's CCS entitlement is 24 hours of subsidy per fortnight (family income is \$66,958 or less and one or both parents do not meet or are not exempt from the activity test).
- The session report is processed and 24 hours of CCS is paid to the service, with the parent paying the full fee for the additional 8 hours of care.
- The following week, the parent updates their activity test details in their Centrelink Online account (through myGov) to indicate they started a new job the week before, which means their entitlement is now 36 hours per fortnight.
- Because the change benefits the parent, it can be backdated up to a maximum of 28 days before they notified Centrelink of the change.
- In this example, the change in the parent's entitlement for the previous week, from 24 to 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight, will trigger a reassessment of that week's session report.
- The payment for the additional 8 hours of CCS will be made directly to the parent, because the parent's entitlement changed after the relevant session report had already been submitted.

Parents will also be paid directly when a provider has submitted session reports before the parent has either lodged their CCS claim for that child, or before the parent has confirmed the enrolment for that child. In these scenarios the enrolment status will be 'pending eligibility' or 'pending confirmation', meaning session reports can be submitted but will not be processed. Once the parent completes the required action/s, these session reports will be processed and any resulting payment will be made directly to the parent.

In all cases where a payment is made directly to the parent, the parent will be able to see a record of this payment through Centrelink Online or the Express Plus mobile app.
