

EVERY DAY COUNTS

Primary school attendance

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early – a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the later years, and receive lower test scores than their classmates. It's vital that students go to school every day – even in the early years of primary school.

What we can do

The main reasons for absence are:

Sickness – There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term if it can be avoided.

"Day off" – Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates – every day counts.

Truancy – This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy. The best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

 Speak with your classroom teacher and find out what work your child needs to do to keep up. Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. A School Attendance Officer is a Department of Education and Training Regional Director who has authority to follow up attendance issues. Attendance issues that are escalated can lead to an Infringement Notice.

If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your classroom teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.

Being a good sport. How to lose gracefully.

While playing a simple board game eg; Dominoes, connect 4, Guess Who, Monopoly, model the behaviour you expect from all players. Talk about what they should say if they lose. Mention that everyone has to lose at some time and it's very easy to be a good winner but harder to be a good loser. What makes any parent most proud is how their children cope/respond when they lose. Encourage and role model such phrases as; "Well done XXX, it's been a great game", "I nearly got you, maybe next time", "Good on you. Let's try again!". They only need to make one comment and move on. Don't forget to praise all participants for trying their best, particularly those who were able to lose gracefully. Numeracy:

This week we will continue reviewing the Semester's work, looking at Money, Data Collection and Fractions. Some children enjoyed making a tally of the colour of cars passing by the school in a ten-minute period. They then used the results to create a graph.

Science:

The children continue broadening their understanding of Earth and Space.

Religious Education:

The topic of Advent is in full swing. The children will recall and share experiences of getting ready for a special event. They will review how Mary and Joseph prepared for the birth of their son Jesus.

Visual Arts:

The children will listen to the story of 'Elmer the Elephant' and create a paper plate Elmer using a paper plate and fabric squares.

Literacy:

Reading – The students are continuing to explore a range of texts written by Indigenous Australian authors as part of the 'Yarning Strong' Oxford book series. During Literacy Circle time the students are engaging in discussion and reflection of these texts through a range of activities. **Writing** – The students are continuing to explore procedural texts as part of their writing sessions this week. They are analysing these texts and discussing their effectiveness in explaining how to do, play or make something. The students are also looking at the language used in these texts (i.e. verbs, adverbs and adverbial phrases) and applying it to write their own procedure text. **Spelling** – This week's spelling rule is when a noun ends in a vowel followed by the letter 'y', make the word plural by adding 's' e.g. key – keys.

Numeracy: This week students are continuing to develop their understanding of multiplication and division using both concrete materials and written strategies. They will draw on the multiplication tables as they solve a range of problems. Please continue to encourage and support your child's automatic recall of the multiplication tables facts at home.

Religious Education: This week the students are finishing off the unit, 'Jesus Models Forgiveness' by reflecting on the four steps of reconciliation (admit responsibility, say sorry, receive forgiveness, and make amends) and relating it to their own lives. The students will also be starting a new unit, 'Christmas the Message of Joy and Peace'. They will develop their understanding of Christmas as a time to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ and that it is a time of sharing joy and peace to the wider community.

Homework: This week's Seesaw Homework task is about 'Measuring Angles'. Using the template, students are required to identify the angles shown on each of the compasses. After recording each of the angle measures, students are asked to record an explanation about each angle e.g. the name of angle (acute, obtuse etc.) and its size. This task is due on Friday. Please contact your child's teacher if you require a new Seesaw home learning code.

***Students are also expected to read 15-20 minutes each night and discuss the text they have read with an adult.

Reminders:

- All students need to be wearing their **school hat** each day when outside at recess and lunch and also during sports sessions. Please check that your child has their **name** on their hat.
- Please ensure that your child is wearing the **correct uniform to school each day**, including Sports uniform on each of their two designated Sports days. As per our uniform policy, coloured sneakers should only be worn on Sports days. If your child is not wearing the correct school uniform for a particular reason, please kindly advise their classroom teacher via email or a note.
- The children cannot use the school bubblers, so please ensure your child/children have a **bottle of water** with them **every day**, particularly as the weather is getting warmer.

<u>Mathematics</u> - This week we continue reviewing the four operations using the Bar Model; mental and written strategies. Students are also exploring language and concepts relating to angles to assist planning and improving their marble runs. Mrs Patterson's sessions with the Year 6 students have been successful and will continue throughout the Term. Mrs Patterson will also be assisting classroom teachers in assessing Year 5 students on an individual basis.

<u>Literacy</u> - The focus in Literacy will be Literacy Circles, exploring vocabulary and discovering etymology of known and unknown words. Students will continue to focus on expository texts and will be constructing a variety of non-fiction writing to accompany their STEM and virtual Show tasks. Students have made circuits this week and looked at explanatory scientific texts.

RE - Discovering our Christian Heritage - Students explore Christianity in the context of its origins in Judaism. Students will also be made aware that there are strong links among the basic beliefs of the world's three monotheistic faiths – Christianity, Judaism and Islam. Students have explored the book of Genesis and have discussed why and when this was written.
