This message still resonates with me (I have the picture on my computer) and never more so than right now as we prepare to celebrate the Feast of the Sacred Heart. The essence of this Feast Day has nothing to do with cardiology and everything to do with the love and compassion that Jesus showed to others. This is the same love and compassion that I wish every child to experience and to go out and share with others. We should all be models of love and compassion (kindness).

One thing that I do know is that we don't really know another person until we've "walked a mile in their shoes". How quick are some of us to look at the plight of others and decide we know what is happening in their lives. I've heard people on welfare described as "lazy layabouts" which is very unfair. I suppose some could be in that position but that should not mean that all are condemned to this tag simply because of their situation. Most people who need assistance are in genuine need and we need to spread our generosity to those that we can. An activity to build vocabulary: Become a food reviewer

How can I help build my child's numeracy?

As parents you play a significant role in your child's learning by setting expectations, nurturing curiosity, and encouraging a love of learning. You can help build your child's numeracy through doing the following:

- be positive about their numeracy experiences and praise effort and perseverance
- let your child know that everyone can be successful
- seize everyday opportunities to capitalise on numeracy development
- involve your child in numeracy-related activities
- describe what you are doing in situations that involve numeracy
- explain why you make certain numeracy choices
- explore numeracy with your child
- learn alongside your child and encourage a sharing of numeracy ideas and thoughts

Helping children to become numerate does not need a high level of mathematics. It means:

- encouraging children to try, then keep trying
- encouraging children to think (reason)
- supporting children while they do homework (which means encouraging them and taking an interest, but not doing the thinking for them)
- modelling numeracy with children (including interpreting data, charts and diagrams)
- talking aloud when solving problems (every day or mathematical)
- getting children to check their answers (Does this answer make sense?)
- encouraging children to help with
- cooking (especially measuring out ingredients)
- paying bills
- scheduling events in the day
- reading maps and giving directions
- shopping
- measuring and thanking them for their support
- do not say "Maths is hard" or "I was never good at maths". Numeracy capability is <u>not</u> inherited but attitudes are contagious.

Reminders:

• This Friday is the last day of term. Just a reminder to parents that we finish at 2.30pm.

Literacy/Inquiry:

This week students will be continuing to work on their information report on their chosen endangered animal. Students have looked at their information and have written notes under their subtitles. These subtitles include 'what does my animal look like, what is its diet, habitat and why is it endangered? From these notes students have expanded the information into proper sentences. Students will then complete a good copy either in a poster form or powerpoint presentation.

Our spelling focus this week continues to be initial (beginning) digraph blends (2 letters making the one sound): cr_, gr_, tr_, br_, dr_, pr_, fr_ and wr_ .

Emphasis is also placed on phonemic awareness and isolating the different sound components in words. This is a vitally important skill to have in place so that we can make accurate approximations when spelling unfamiliar words.

Example: The word 'draw' can be broken into two sound parts - dr-aw

Religion:

This week we will be finishing up our topic of 'Sacraments of Eucharist'. On Friday the whole school will be attending Church celebrating the 'Feast of the Sacred Heart', if you are free you are most welcome to join us. The Mass starts at 12.00pm.

Homework:

This week the students have not been given any homework due to school holidays commencing at the end of the week. We do however, encourage that your child reads at least 20 minutes a night through the school holidays.

Numeracy:

This week we are finishing up our topic of subtraction and moving onto problem-solving using addition and subtraction. Students will be asked to brainstorm different problem-solving strategies that they are familiar with, such as drawing a diagram, making a number sentence, making a table, estimating and checking or acting it out. Students will be given a variety of open-ended problem-solving questions and they will systematically work through the given problem.
