Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships

Gender and Identity

Gender norms are those social norms that are differentiated for girls and boys, and men and women. While some gender norms can be positive, (such as showing loyalty to family) others can be restrictive and harmful in that they limit people's life choices, lead to inequitable treatment or discrimination, and foster acceptance of gender-based violence.

Beliefs about gender norms and roles are socially constructed. That is, the types of behaviours considered acceptable, appropriate or desirable for a person based on their gender are created by societies. Gender norms include attitudes about what it means to act, speak, dress and express oneself as masculine or feminine. Different gender identities are created through various elements coming together at any point in time, drawing on social expectations which can change depending on where in life's stage an individual is located. Children need to learn about the ways in which gender norms are created and transmitted. They benefit from critical thinking exercises within which they detect and challenge the limiting nature of many traditional gender-norms.

Pragmatics and Social skills

Focus: Conflict resolution

Conflict can arise for any number of reasons. As adults we can model and guide our children to solve conflicts in the most effective way possible. Don't forget not all conflicts can be resolved and we simply need to just agree to disagree. However, it is important to agree/disagree in a respectful manner. Here are some comments you might like to promote around your house when not everybody is on the same page.

Agree: "I think that's a great idea, let's go with it!"

Disagree: "I can see what you're saying, but I think this because..."

"That's a good idea but how about?"

"I can sort of see your point of view, but we're going to have to agree to disagree"

Have these phrases written and placed around the house for reminders

Here's some conflict resolution topics you might like to discuss as a family (remember no put-downs);

- dogs are better than cats
- children should make their beds everyday
- children should go to bed by 8 o'clock
- children should only have 1 hour of tv each night
- Collingwood is the best football team.

Families are not under any obligation to purchase books if they do not wish to.



WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

FOUNDATION - Caz & Trish

CONGRATULATIONS to our marvellous students and parents for arriving at school on time, with a healthy snack and lunch, in the correct uniform for 100 days! THANK YOU

What a lovely day we had with our teddies at school on Tuesday to celebrate 100 days of school.

Religion: This week the students will create their own prayer book. They will discuss and create four different prayers we can use - Asking, Forgiving, Praise and Thank you prayers.

Literacy: This week's non-fiction books. Foundation Levesque - 'Baby Elephants'

Foundation Shaw - 'Dinosaurs"

The students will work through a variety of activities related to the big book in their class. They will continue to write lists, gather facts and create fact book/posters relating to the big book. The students will continue to practise the one hundred most frequently used words, rhyme, syllables and find blends in words. This week the children will focus on the short vowel 'i', e.g. it and in.

Mathematics: The students will be investigating the maths process of addition. They will be using a range of practical strategies for adding small groups of numbers, such as visual displays and concrete materials.

Inquiry: The children will continue with the unit, <u>'Fairness and Friendship'</u> the students will continue to work on how to be a helpful classmate and how to show fairness in our everyday lives. The students are investigating words and meanings in this area. E.g. Fair, Fun, Honest, Safe etc. What do these words look like, sound like and act like.

RRRR's: The students will be exploring the terms of same and different. They will see several images of different dog breeds. They will wonder about how these dogs can be different. They will be encouraged to tell or express in a 'wondering', that boys and girls can be the same and different. *eg I wonder if boys and girls can be the same and different? What do you think?*

Show and Tell -

This week - Something that begins or ends with the sound 'sh'. **Next week -** Something that begins or ends with the sound 'ch'.

YEAR ONE/TWO - Janina, Amanda, David & Karen

On Monday, the Year 1 and 2 students said 'Goodbye and good luck' to Will McKenzie who will continue his schooling in Yarrawonga.

Our learning focus for the week -

<u>Literacy</u> - our spelling topics are 'w as in wet' and 'cl as in clap'. We are impressed with the students continuing to find and name the reasons for the use of apostrophes in our readers and class stories - seeing how they are used to show possession eg. Joe's dog and to shorten words eg. do not becomes don't. We will continue to read different forms of poetry and give the students opportunities to create their own poems. This term, many of our class stories focus on the differences and uniqueness of us all. It has been great to see the students listening attentively to these stories and discussing the message presented.

<u>Mathematics</u> - through various games and practical situations, the students will learn about 'fractions of a whole'. Through discussions about where they see or hear about fractions eg. cutting pizza and cake, the students will be encouraged to count the number of 'equal parts' and name the fraction shown.

<u>Inquiry</u> - we continue with our unit 'Celebrate Differences' in our world. We looked at a map of the world and named the countries that we can see and discussed people that we know, who have come from other countries. The students were then asked to think about what people from other countries would need to know about Australia and used this to create their own 'Guide to Australia' with interesting words, foods and other facts.

<u>Religion</u> - Our unit 'We can pray in different ways' continues with the students looking at who we can prayer for. Using Pope Francis's 5 finger prayer, we will create oral and written prayers for the important people in our lives. You might like to also ask your child about the significance of the pretzel - an activity that will occur later in the week.

OZGrav Space Exhibit ~ Reflection by Mia Crimmins and Eva Parkinson

Last Wednesday 24th July 2019 the 3/4 students attended an exhibition all about Space which was presented by Ozgrav, at the Wangaratta Digital Hub. We got to experience a variety of activities.

The highlight of the exhibition was the Virtual Reality (VR) tour of the solar system. We had to get into pairs, and we shared a pair of special VR goggles controlled by a computer app. Lisa, a lady who works for Ozgrav explained the different parts of the VR tour as we experienced it. We looked at all the planets and blackholes. In one of the tours of the blackholes the blackholes actually orbited around each other and when they smashed together the result was one big blackhole.

We also really enjoyed working at the exhibits presented by the Galen Vex Robotics students. There were two activities to do. The first one was called 'Sphero Maze'. This was based on a sphero education app. In this activity we got to have a turn at controlling the spheros using an ipad app. We had to move the sphero through a maze by swiping a remote control on the iPad. The other robotics activity was called 'Zombie Robots'. This was based on three human robots and three alien robots. The alien robots had to hit the human robots a number of times and the human robots had to hit the alien robots a number of times as well. If the robot's lights turned red it meant that it had been turned into a zombie.

This was an amazing experience to be involved in because we learnt a lot about Space and the Solar System as well as different technologies.

School Camp: Please return permission notes and medical forms as soon as possible as this allows adequate time for staff to plan the camp. Any parents wishing to go into the ballot as 'camp helpers' are also asked to return the 'expression of interest' as soon as possible so that we can complete this part of the process. This will then allow the selected parents to make plans with their respective employers.

Literacy and Inquiry: This week during Reading sessions the students will continue to develop their understanding of the structure of a biography by exploring a variety of texts. In conjunction with the Inquiry unit, 'Someone Else's Shoes', during Writing sessions this week students will be focusing on researching and taking notes on a well-known person with a disability. This will lead on to students constructing their own biographies.

Spelling: ck as in attack and th as in length

Religious Education: This week our students are continuing to focus on the unit, 'Followers of Jesus'. They will be reflecting on what it means to be a follower of Jesus and they will also begin to explore the parables, miracles and stories that identify the many choices Jesus made, and recognise that they have been gifted with the Spirit to enable them to make wise choices for the good of themselves and others.

Numeracy: Students are continuing to work through the unit related to 'Location and Transformation'. This week they will be applying their understanding of grid referencing to a Bee Bot investigation. They will be required to code the Bee Bots to perform a given set of movements.

Uniform: Please ensure that students come to school in correct school uniform, including appropriate footwear. We do understand that there will be times when children have outgrown footwear and that this is an expensive uniform item. If your child is required to be 'out of uniform' for some reason, please advise Mr Corrigan and your child's teacher.

APSMO Maths Games contest 3

Curriculum News:

Numeracy Focus

This week students are preparing for the APSMO Maths Games contest next week. Students are working through problems in small teams. The focus strategies for the contest are Work Backwards and Make a List. Students continue to apply their understanding of the BAR Model to solving multi-step problems that involve fractions and all four processes.

Reading Focus - Students continue to develop reading skills through Literacy Circles and are reading and sharing parables from the Bible through Readers Theatre.

Writing - Students are publishing their written pieces about for possible entry into the Wangaratta Sustainability Network 'Life of a Water Bottle' competition. The students will also be recording a podcast in response to the Adam Goodes Documentary "The Final Quarter".

Inquiry - We begin to discuss and investigate organisations that 'Care for the Kids' both in Australia and overseas. Students will select an organisation working to support children to investigate further.

RE - We continue to look at the role Jesus played in Luke's Gospel through the parables and examining people, context and messages from Luke's Gospel and considering how these messages are relevant today. Students will 'recontextualise' (make the Bible relevant to their lives) a parable through readers theatre and share with the class.

Mass - 5/6 Ackerly/Higgs will be attending mass at St Patrick's Church on Friday with Foundation Levesque students.

Radio - Lucy N and Emily Y from 5/6 Rickard, will be presenting the St Patrick's Radio Hour on Thursday from 2:00pm on Oak FM.

RRRR'S - This term we exploring issues relating to gender and identity.
