A letter to Parents re. Composite classes

Dear Parents,

I write this in the hope that it may allay any misgivings regarding St Patrick's decision to change back to composite classes. I have had two families come and speak to me and I was more than happy to discuss their concerns. However, I am aware that there may be other families who have misgivings.

Any decision made at St Patrick's School puts the needs of the students first and what is in their best interests. We would never introduce any action that would jeopardise the excellent standards attained here at this beautiful school.

The process used to come to this decision was over meetings and consultations with the whole staff as to the best way forward. The staff overwhelmingly voted to re-establish composite classes as they were deemed to give the students the best opportunities. Staff discern no difference between straight and composite classes. This is due to their experience and the modern teaching and learning strategies used in schools to attain progress.

In any sense, there is no real difference between composite and straight classes as modern teaching methods cater for the needs of each student, as opposed to my primary education where teachers taught to a year level and students were either excellent, average or deficit in their learning. These days, we look at the learning needs of each student. In this sense a straight class is no different to a composite class in that we challenge students to meet their potential and not conscript students to some generic graded system. Some of our students work well beyond their year level, some are working within the expectations of their year level whilst others, who may have diagnosed and undiagnosed learning difficulties, need extra support. This is the same in any classroom, straight or composite.

Research tells us that it is the quality of the teachers that has the most profound impact on student learning and not whether classes are composite or straight. I know that I am biased, but it is my belief that the teacher quality is exceptional at St Patrick's. The data collected on student's progress over the years would also support this fact.

The decision to change back to composite classes is due, in the large part, to ensuring that class sizes remain equitable. Composite classes will keep class sizes down and maximise learning opportunities for students. There are many positive attributes to composites and there has been considerable research done to suggest that there is no difference in academic outcomes between composite and straight classes. There is considerable information available on the world wide web that also supports this notion.

One of the reasons that we adopted straight classes a few years ago was due, in the main part, to a new national curriculum being introduced and, as our numbers at the time were conducive to it, it was thought by staff that it would assist in becoming more quickly familiar with the requirements.

I am only too pleased to speak with parents about our class structures for 2019 as, when we work together (school and family), the greatest beneficiaries are the students.

I have included two excerpts on composites that I quickly found online. There are many, many more available if you are interested.

I hope that I have been able to set your minds at ease that going back to composite classes will have no bearing on the student's learning or development. In actual fact, composites play a positive role in the development of student's social learning.

I look forward to hearing from you should you have any concerns.

Why have composite classes?

Composite classes happen for a number of reasons. A school may have them due to uneven enrolments by age group – for example, there's a larger than average intake of Year 3 and a smaller group of Year 4 enrolments. In order to keep class size to the optimal number, the school may decide to run one Year 3 class and a Year 3 and 4 composite class to allow for two evenly sized classes. Similarly, some schools have low enrolment numbers overall and may combine several grades to make up classroom numbers - this is more common in rural areas, where classes may be made up of children from a wider range of age groups.

"If [in these examples] there were no composite classes, there would be difficulty staffing all classes - some would be full to the brim and others quite empty, which then brings up the problem of equity," explains education expert <u>Tim Heinecke</u>.

Sometimes, however, composite classes are formed for educational reasons in schools where it is felt that the mixing of children of different ages is educationally and socially advantageous. The NSW Department of Education and Training reports the number of schools in this category has been increasing steadily during the past 10 years. (www.kidspot.com.au)

Composite education is backed up by the theory of teaching by 'stages, not ages." Students are able to work to their own developmental level, rather than grade expectations. Composite classes have become a common feature in many urban Australian schools. In Victoria, almost half of all state primary students are taught in composite grades. This theory that children should be taught 'by stages, not ages' points out that in life, age stratification does not exist. As it has been established, the age of a student does not define the learning outcomes. What does play a significant role in the positive outcomes is more dependent upon quality teaching than anything else. The quality of teaching, combined with student interest and engagement, are considered more important than class structure, whatever form it may take. Research, which has been predominantly conducted in primary schools, suggests there is no visible difference between composite and straight grade classrooms in terms of academic performance.

Here are some key benefits of composite classes:

- Older students are able to practice and reinforce their own skills as they teach them to younger students as mentors and experts.
- Older students provide a model of appropriate behaviour for the younger students this also means less behavioural problems in the classroom because younger students integrate quickly into established class routines as modelled by the older students.
- Younger students are able to seek help from a wider range of people rather than relying on the teacher to help them all the time.
- Changing the focus of learning from achieving a certain 'grade' to individual personal best alters the nature of the learning experience to lead children to value learning and the learning process.
- Students develop a greater respect for individual differences across the board.

Rights, Resilience and Respectful Relationships

Gender and Identity

- Students understand how emotional responses impact on others' feelings
- Students recognise how strengths and achievements contribute to identities
- Students select strategies at home and/or school to keep themselves healthy and safe and are able to ask for help with tasks or problems
- Students demonstrate positive ways to interact with others

Resilience, what is it?

What does resilience look like?

There's probably not one way to describe what resilience looks like and, of course, no-one is resilient all of the time. There are some characteristics that we might expect to see in a child who is coping well or is resilient. For instance, they might:

- · use positive self-talk for encouragement
- capably express their feelings and thoughts
- not hide away from strong feelings
- have helpful, age-appropriate strategies to manage their emotions if they are upset
- rearrange their plans to work around an unexpected situation
- use a trial-and-error approach in their daily life
- remain hopeful and keep on trying if something doesn't work out
- know when to stop trying if they decide the effort is not worthwhile
- actively ask for help if they need it.

It's important to note that children can appear resilient on the outside but not actually be resilient. They may have learned to behave in ways that are acceptable to the adults around them. Sometimes, these children can go under the radar in a school or community setting. A child like this might:

- not openly express their feelings
- put on a front (even though it's obvious they are struggling)
- not fully engage in what's happening around them
- not fully connect with other children and adults in their lives
- tend to give up if things don't go well in the first instance
- not appear confident in dealing with situations themselves (but might not make a fuss about it).

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

FOUNDATION - Caz, Karen & Trish

Welcome to Week 4. We continue to be amazed with how quickly the term is flying and take pride in the wonderful achievements of our students. Thank you for your continued support.

Religion

We continue to explore the unit, 'I Am Special So Are You'. This week, the students will listen to more stories about the uniqueness of others. We will also explore bible stories and bible verses that explore the concept that 'God made them so wonderfully'.

Literacy

We continue to explore Fairy Tales through reading, watching and retelling. The students have become very good at sharing their existing knowledge of fairy tales already heard and predicting what may happen within unknown fairy tales. We will continue to focus on punctuation whilst reading and writing. Why do we use punctuation? What punctuation marks can you find in your child's reader?

Foundation Shaw - The Elves and the Shoemaker

Foundation Bray - Three Little Pigs

Foundation Levesque - Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs

Mathematics

This week, the students will continue to explore the concept of 'Subtraction'. Through the telling of stories and representing these with concrete materials, the students will further their understanding that the total is less than what they started with. Using known facts such as 'doubles' and 'near doubles', many subtraction equations can also be solved without counting.

Inquiry

As a part of our unit 'Great and Small', the students will explore the habit of mind 'Finding humour' and how we can use this to feel better. The students will also explore how orangutans and chimpanzees can laugh like us. I wonder if the students can investigate animals that can do tricks? We will also explore how it is important for us when caring for animals, to be aware of everything in the world around them. By exploring the question 'How do animals sense the environment?', the students will discover that because animals have different body parts, their senses are different. The students might like to think about what animal sense they would like to have.

YEAR ONE/TWO - Janina, Amanda, David, Fran & Erin

Welcome to Week 4 of the term, another busy week with lots going on at school. Just a little reminder that the children need to wear their hats every day in order to play on the lovely new playground. There are a few different excursions planned for the Year One and Two students over the next few weeks so please keep an eye out for Permission forms coming home with your children and return them promptly if possible. If you are able to accompany us on any of our excursions please let your child's teacher know as we always welcome the extra support.

LITERACY

Year One Reading: We are continuing our focus on summarising to help us comprehend what we read. We are using Big Books and Picture Story Books when completing summarising activities.

Writing: In writing we are finishing off our 'Animal Information Reports' and hoping to present these to our classmates in the coming week.

Spelling: We are continuing to look at 'ar' words and recognise these words in both our reading and writing work.

Year Two Reading: This week we are revising key understandings within a text, beyond and about the text.

Writing: We are continuing to look at editing of work with the emphasis continuing on correct punctuation and spelling.

Spelling: This week we are looking at 'ould' as in "would". There are not many of these words because we are not spelling words like shoulder, mould.

MATHS

Year One - We continue our unit of work on Data - representing and interpreting data. The children will gather a variety of information and present their findings using graphs. The children are really enjoying surveying their classmates on topics such as - favourite pets/hair and eye colour/what would be the best veggies to plant in our school veggie gardens? And representing their findings in a variety of ways.

Year Two - Students will be generating statements about graphs. They will be provided with sentence starters or cloze sentences to assist them in developing their own sentences based on the data in tallies and graphs.

We will ensure students understand that their statements need to come directly from the data in front of them and not from other experiences or knowledge that they have relating to the topic.

Daily practice activity

Ask students to find data displays at home, such as graphs in newspapers or magazines, and bring them to class. Set aside time to share and discuss these each day.

RELIGION

This week is Mission Week and today we participated in 'Socktober', with the children being asked to bring in a gold coin in exchange for wearing 'crazy' socks. This is a wonderful time to reflect on those less fortunate than us and be active in our faith by raising funds and donating to charity.

INQUIRY

Our focus on 'Our Community' continues with an excursion to the CFA for Year Two on Wednesday 31st October at 1.30pm and then the following Wednesday 7th November at 1.30pm for the Year One children.

Literacy:

Reading:

This week the students will either be continuing with their reading circles or finishing off their books and completing a small book report presentation.

Writing:

This week in writing, students will be completing a recount of their experience at Harrietville then writing an information report about the history of Harrietville and what the camp has to offer.

Spelling:

This week in spelling we are doing suffixes endings in "ing" and "ed". For example words such as stopping and stopped.

Numeracy:

Literacy:

In Reading this week we are continuing to learn to think critically about different types of texts. We have continued investigating the Non-Fiction genre. We are exploring the characteristics of subgenres including expositions, biographies, autobiographies, persuasive pieces and information texts. You might like to read some non-fiction texts at home like The Guiness Book of World Records, newspaper articles, letters to the editor, 'Deadly 60' books. We are also doing literacy circles, it's where we are all split into different groups and we read a different novel in our groups. Our activity this week is word finder, where we have to find words that we don't know the meaning of and find what they mean so we can understand the text. We have to use the clues in the passage to help us infer the meaning.

In Writing, we continue to write and edit our narratives on the Sidney Nolan artwork. We are starting to edit to use an 'expensive' vocabulary to try and make our stories more interesting. We will also be looking into StoryBird, an online story creator.

Numeracy:

We are finishing our unit on fractions and decimals this week. We will be working on achieving personal goals we have set ourselves from the pre-assessment and throughout the unit, so that we can smash our post test. Individuals are working on very varied goals depending on their point of need. Goals might include adding and subtracting same and related denominators, multiplying and dividing decimals by powers of 10s, multiplying and dividing common fractions or decimals, comparing equivalent fractions or locating fractions on a number line. We have been understanding how to locate common fractions on a number line by working out where the tenths are. We have used ropes, pegs and post it notes to help us to understand and remember.

Religious Education:

This week we will be reading the book 'The Grand Mosque of Paris' By <u>Karen Ruelle</u>. It is a non-fiction picture story book that looks at the Muslims who helped to rescue the Jews during Nazi Occupation. We are looking at 'stereotypes' related to religion.

Inquiry:

This Term in Inquiry we are participating in the Data and Decisions Unit. We will be studying the difference between what we want and what we need. We will be investigating the types of things that we have and how we use them in our life. We have a piece of paper in our homework book for our parents to fill out, so we can collect data to help guide us with designing and marketing a product in our groups. Please complete the anonymous survey when you get a chance.

Homework

Please encourage your child to take responsibility for completing their homework. Building in 'workable routines' on nights that are not too busy will assist in this process. Homework is due this week *Thursday 8th November* (Year 5 Nicoll/Lynch and Year 6 Ackerly) and *Friday 9th November* (Year 5 O'Connor and Year 6 Rickard). Parents are encouraged to take an active role in homework by discussing the requirements with their child. If your child is unsure of any task, they should discuss this at an appropriate time with their teacher.

Year 6 Robotics:

This week year 6 Ackerly started building our robots. We are working in partners to problem solve. We will go to GoTafe in a couple of weeks to program the robots to do something amazing.



Jesse, Angus and Jay have built their robot and look forward to programming it.

Conditions of Entry for the St Patrick's Wangaratta Colour Run

<u>Preparation, risks and injury</u> – I acknowledge and understand that:

- Running & walking is a strenuous physical activity and I am responsible for all training and preparation for this event.
- As this is a physical activity, there is a risk of injury when participating on the day.
- The organisers will take safety precautions to ensure that the event runs as smoothly and as risk free as possible.
- There will be natural coloured powder thrown on part of the course that is 98% corn starch & 2% food colouring. This powder is completely safe and can be used around people suffering from asthma.
- The volunteers will do their best to throw the powder at the torso, however wind and other factors can cause the powder to protrude on the face. You may wish for your child to bring their own eye protection such as sunglasses or goggles.
- Participants will need to be mindful of potential hazards that may exist on the course such as, but not limited to, uneven surfaces, branches, logs and native fauna.

SUPERVISION: I understand that I am responsible for the supervision of my child/ren at the event. Children 11 years of age and under need to be accompanied by a parent or guardian whilst on course. If my child/ren are attending with another family, then I give permission for the attending family to act on my/our behalf in relation to my/our child/ren.

Pets: are not permitted at the event

<u>Medical Treatment</u>: In the event of accident or illness, I consent to myself and/or child (when I am not present i.e. my older child/ren are on the course) receiving first aid and/or medical treatment which may be advisable in the event of illness or injury suffered by me or my child during the event.

<u>Privacy</u>: I give permission for my image and that of my children to be used to promote or report on the event. This can include, but is not limited to, local media outlets, social media sites (eg Facebook) as well as school newsletters etc.
