# Confirmation and Eucharist (Children in Grade 5)



As you would recall, the Sacraments of Confirmation/Eucharist did not proceed last year due to COVID restrictions. The Sacraments will be celebrated on the weekend of the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> March for the students who missed out last year. There will be a practice session on 18<sup>th</sup> March at 7.00pm at the church where your child will be making their Sacraments.

Families involved will have received a letter with the details of the ceremony your child has been allocated. Your child has been sent home with the form that you most likely filled in last year, before COVID cancelled the reception of the Sacraments.

It may be wise to fill this form in again just to be sure your child's details are at the Presbytery. Please send it to school ASAP and once they are all collected, we will take them to the Presbytery.

A second celebration of these Sacraments is set down for 28<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> August for children who would normally be celebrating the Sacraments this year. More on that later.

By now you would have received your child's new weekly timetable and there are just a couple of changes.

As the weather is starting to cool down and the students are wearing jumpers and jackets, could we please ask you to remember to label your child's belongings.

#### **CURRICULUM**

#### **Religion:**

This week we have begun our unit, 'Lent and Easter'. The students will be introduced to Lent and Easter and the significance of this time. They will develop an awareness of signs and symbols associated with Lent and Easter. We have also been sharing stories from the Project Compassion 'BE MORE, Caritas organisation. #### Literacy:

Big Books: Patterson - 'Mrs Wishy Washy's Tub' - Shaw - 'Smarty Pants'.

The students are quickly recognising the repetition in our weekly big books and are beginning to notice the site words. They are also learning to identify 'who', 'what', 'where' and 'what doing' from the story. The students will continue to learn what makes up a sentence, where to start reading and keeping track with our eyes as we read. The students will continue to participate in our daily Heggerty Program. This looks at all aspects relating to phonemic awareness. You may see your child say; 'thumbs up or thumbs down' for rhyming words, or 'get your choppers' out for syllables and to hear the final phoneme in a word we 'punch it out'.

#### **Ipads - PM Reading App:**

Children are enjoying the PM reading App to support reading development. The students explored the OSMO Word app this week. We are amazed at how quickly they are learning their letter and sounds.

During writing, the students will continue to observe explicit writing instruction lessons on how to begin the writing process. They will continue to learn to 'write' and draw a message for others to read. They are focusing on, 'I can write down what I hear' with a particular focus on hearing and recording the initial (first) and final (last) sound in a word as we write them down. The children are enjoying learning that a sentence is made up of words and has spaces after each word.

#### **Mathematics:**

Our topic is 'Subitising'. Subitising is the process of immediately recognising how many items are in a small group. The name comes from the Italian word subito, which means 'immediately' or 'right now. Subitising contributes to early forms of grouping by 'chunking' information. The children will explore using concrete materials, ten frames and making collections, in order to order and compare collections of numbers. The key vocab words we will use are; subitising, estimation, guess, more, most, less, least, same.

#### **Inquiry (MAPPEN)**:

This week we began our unit 'Shaping Identity'. Students will learn about the identity of other students in the class as they create pictographs. Your students will learn about 'Sometimes' foods and 'Always' foods and consider how they use their bodies. They students will learn how to get help in the classroom and in the schoolyard and how to use objects safely. By considering what they like and learning ways of expressing what they like, students will be better able to set and reach new goals.

#### **Essential questions**

What is my identity? What is the classroom identity? How should I ask for help? Who should I ask for help? How do I stay safe and healthy?

#### YEAR ONE/TWO – Karen, Caz & Sarah

We hope you all enjoyed a relaxing long weekend. We should feel very fortunate that the beautiful weather and the current situation in Victoria is allowing us to get out and about.

This week's focus -

Religion - The students will continue to further explore what the Lenten season means to us and look at the signs and symbols of Lent such as the colour purple and the importance of the cross. This year, the Caritas theme is "Aspire not to have more, but to be more". This certainly has been

evident in the way the students have been helping out at home and making generous donations to our classroom Caritas collection boxes. As a unit, we are very proud of the students following the theme to 'Be more' and we now have enough money to buy blankets, material to make masks and of course, money for communities to buy chickens.

Literacy - The students will explore sentence structure using past/present and future tense and encourage the students to identify this through our read aloud, individual and guided reading. Using colourful semantics, (nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs) We will encourage the students to add important details to their writing. The students are identifying the different purposes of texts and are enjoying, creating their own published texts for a variety of purposes. Our handwriting sessions this week will look at 'grass letters', of which many of the lower-case letters are, with the focus on consistent size and correct pencil grip.

Mathematics - The students will continue to explore how to recognise, model, read and order numbers, with the focus on identifying how many digits are in specific numbers and develop further confidence with counting sequences beyond twos, fives and tens. The students will also be encouraged to name and use effective mental and written strategies to solve addition equations. The students will learn this through activities that involve real life mathematics such as counting students in the school, counting collections of school home and school supplies and supermarket items.

Rotations - Students and teachers are enjoying our Friday changeovers. It has been great for us all to get to know each other in our 1/2 unit.

Inquiry - This week will involve using Mind maps to explore the student's life events until now eg. looking at hobbies, places they have been and important people in their life.

4R's -The students will continue to identify and name emotions. They will discuss why they feel these emotions and what they can do when they feel these emotions.

Technology -The students will continue to learn how to use the iPads correctly.

#### Literacy:

During Reading sessions students are exploring a variety of fiction and non-fiction text types. As part of daily Interactive Read Aloud (IRA) sessions we have been using the Kids News platform to read about current news content that has been produced for students in the primary classroom. We have been exploring and contextualising subject-specific vocabulary as well as interpreting and responding to the information presented. Students are learning to think 'within', 'beyond' and 'about' the text, using different systems to process text. During independent reading rotations, students are using the Reading Eggspress platform to read and discuss assigned fictional texts. They are learning how to conduct discussion groups and determining the difference

between plausible and unlikely multiple-choice question responses. Through this process, students are also learning how to listen to others and respect different opinions or points of view.

In Writing, students are constructing their narratives using their narrative plans. Through modelling by the teacher, the students are learning how to bring the ideas in their plans together so as to write interesting stories that clearly demonstrate a problem(s) experienced by the character(s), a solution and a conclusion.

Our spelling this week focuses on the phoneme '-ow' as in cowboy, '-ou' as in shout. We are also learning how to correctly apply the suffixes '-tion', '-sion' and 'cian'.

#### **Numeracy:**

This week in Numeracy the students continue their focus on Place Value through different tasks

and games, using a variety of concrete materials. The students are learning to recognise, model, represent and order numbers as well as applying place value to partition, rearrange and regroup numbers. They are also exploring expanded notation of numbers in the hundreds, thousands, tens of thousands and beyond. Place Value plays a very important part in understanding the fundamentals of mathematics, as well as being a starting point for the understanding of other base systems.

#### Homework:

Every week the Year 3/4 homework requirement involves reading each evening and recording a summary of the text on the reading log sheet, which is stuck in the homework book. This week, students are also required to teach family members how to play the game, "Guess My Number". The rules of this game are glued into the homework books. It is a game that students have learnt how to play in class.

\*\*Please ensure that your child puts their homework book into their bags on Thursday night, for submission on Friday morning.

#### **Religious Education:**

This week the students are starting a new unit, 'Easter – New Life'. In this unit, students will be given the opportunity to discover ways to use their gifts and talents to help others during Lent, in preparation for Easter. They will also explore experiences of 'death' and 'new life' in their lives and how this is related to the Church's celebration of the Easter season.

#### BE PERSISTENT, LEARN TOGETHER



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#### **CSEF ELIGIBILITY**

Below is the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).

#### Criteria 1 - Eligibility

To be eligible\* for the fund, a parent or legal guardian of a student attending a registered Government or nongovernment Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- · on the first day of Term one, or;
- · on the first day of Term two.
- a) Be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, OR
- b) Be a temporary foster parent, and;
- c) Submit an application to the school by the due date.
- \* A special consideration eligibility category also exists. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above.

#### Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and 17 years of age inclusive.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between five and 18 years inclusive.

CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooled, or TAFE.

#### **Eligibility Date**

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (27th January 2021) or term two (19th April 2021).

#### **PAYMENT AMOUNTS**

#### **CSEF** payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- · Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
- · Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly to your child's school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

**For ungraded students**, the rate payable is determined by the student's date of birth. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

**Year 7 government school students** who are CSEF recipients are also eligible for a uniform voucher. Secondary schools are required to make applications on behalf of parents so please register your interest at the school.

#### **HOW TO COMPLETE THE APPLICATION FORM**

#### NOTE: ALL SECTIONS MUST BE COMPLETED BY PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN

- 1. Complete the PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN DETAILS section.
  - Make sure that the Surname, First Name, and Customer Reference Number (CRN) details match those on your concession card. You will also need to provide your concession card to the school.
  - If you are claiming as a Foster Parent or a Veteran Affairs Pensioner, you will need to provide a copy of documentation confirming your status as a temporary Foster Parent or provide your Veterans Affairs Pensioner Gold card to the school.
- 2. Complete the STUDENT/S DETAILS section for students at this school.
- 3. Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible. The CSEF program for 2021 closes on 25<sup>th</sup> June 2021.

CSEF payments cannot be claimed retrospectively for prior years.
