## **Families**

If COVID19 has made me reflect on anything, it's the importance of COMMUNITY!

Even during the most troubling and stressful times this year, I am aware of the sense of community that exists here at this school. In some ways, I see it as a big family.

Now I know that family life doesn't always run smoothly. I have three brothers and we didn't always get on well. But it is one thing to fight with your brothers (and we often did – most started as play fighting and then got a little more serious!), but it's another thing entirely for someone to say or do anything regarding a member of your family. There is an emotional glue that binds families together. Most would call it LOVE! I love my brothers dearly and there is nothing that I would not do for them. Oh, I'm aware of their failings and idiosyncrasies as they are aware of mine. But we are family and we look out for each other.

This year has taught me a lot about this school family of ours. I've seen teachers supporting parents and vice-versa. I've seen a commitment to be the best for the students which brings out the best in us. I've also seen students "step up" and make the most out of a "not ideal" situation. For that they should be congratulated and applauded.

Being a Catholic School, we have a commitment to community. To being inclusive. To support those in need. To model values of respect and empathy. To be a model of Jesus, which has at its core, to love one another. We won't always get it right but that should never stop us from trying.

Dear Parents,

Well, I've just welcomed the first group of Foundation students and their parents into our school. I have to admit, this year, it feels a bit surreal as we can only have ten students at a time with their parents. So, today, we had a number of small groups through the school. Although this was exciting enough, you can't beat the whole cohort together. I would have loved to offer our new parents an opportunity for a coffee and a chat and I can only hope that I get to do this in coming weeks should COVID restrictions continue to ease.

## Parent/Teacher Interviews

Thanks to the great co-operation between parents and teachers, our Parent/Teacher interviews have gone better than I could have hoped. As you all know, these interviews are being conducted mainly by telephone due to COVID restrictions currently in place. Feedback from teachers is that it has been very successful with great communication occurring. Thank you to our parents for their continued support and to the teachers for their diligence and professionalism.

## KIRRA PENDERGAST – PARENT SESSION

Thank you to the parents who were able to attend our virtual meeting with Kirra Pendergast on Monday evening. I have had a few conversations with parents who attended who said they thought that it was excellent. Kirra was able to expose a number of issues of safety when using Apps and programs popular with students. It was a bit of an "eye opener" really. She was also able to contextualise the use of technology as something that is firmly embedded in everyone's lives, so "blanket banning" technology will do little to address the problem. Education is key.

The work Kirra did with the teachers on Monday was also invaluable. It gave us great cause to do a bit of a rethink around the measures that we take to keep our students safe in the cyber world.

There will be some changes made in coming days as I have become aware of some students accessing their phones at school which is not allowed.

Although we agree that, in some instances, phones can provide an added layer of protection for students (especially bus children), I have been made aware that some children are accessing them during the day which is forbidden at school. Students who bring phones to school will now be required to either keep them in their bags or hand them to their teacher to look after for the day (collecting them at the end of the day). The means of overseeing this will be dependent on individual teachers.

Use of mobile phones at school is forbidden (always has been) as it can be a breach of privacy and expose students to potential dangers when unsupervised. Any student found with a phone in their possession will have it taken from them and parents notified. Our aim is to keep our students safe.

Kirra will visit St Patrick's in 2021 to work with students around some of the themes discussed with parents and teachers.

We have had to do this whilst complying with COVID19 restrictions so the first meeting will be a little different to our usual gatherings. Hopefully, in coming weeks, we will be in a position to do what we normally do.

## COVID NEWS

The current restrictions include:

- limiting visitors on site all visitors to the school will need to enter via the office and sign in.
- cleaning and personal hygiene

#### **Health Requirements**

One of the most important things we can do to slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) in our community is to stay at home when we are unwell, even when we have the mildest of symptoms.

#### What you need to know:

\* If a child becomes unwell during the day, they must be collected from school as soon as possible.

## If a child has any of the symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) outlined below, however mild, they should get tested and they must remain at home until they receive their results:

- fever
- chills or sweats
- cough
- sore throat
- shortness of breath
- runny nose
- loss of sense of smell or taste.

In certain circumstances headache, muscle soreness, stuffy nose, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea may also be considered symptoms.

#### Religion

The students continue to explore the Religious Education unit called, 'Our Church'.

The students have been discussing ways that you can and do celebrate in their families. They have responded through discussion and drawing times when they felt they belonged at a family celebration.

#### Literacy

We have been investigating non-fiction books. The students continue to discover many facts about different topics.

We will continue to find rhyme, syllables and synonyms from words in the big book. The students are busy concentrating on using correct punctuation in their writing. They are providing information in their writing about facts they have learnt from listening to the Big Book.

#### Maths - Place Value

This week the students will revise 'Place Value', and that numbers all have a value.' They will be identifying the number words in sequence, backwards and forwards, and reasoning with the number sequences, establishing the language on which subsequent counting experiences can be built.

They will be developing fluency with forwards and backwards counting in meaningful contexts, including stories and rhymes. The students will understand that numbers are said in a particular order and there are patterns in the way we say them.

We hope everyone enjoyed the long weekend! Our teachers enjoyed the parent teacher interviews which were held on Monday and look forward to catching up with the other parents this afternoon. It is fantastic to talk about the achievements of your children and the wonderful things they have done this year and also set goals for the future.

#### Literacy:

**Reading** - this week the students are continuing to focus on identifying and understanding the purpose and features of non-fiction texts. They are practicing responding to comprehension questions related to non-fiction texts. The students are also focusing on 'Procedural' texts which explains how to do or make something. They are exploring the different ways procedural texts may be presented - that is, in spoken, written or visual format. They are also being guided to see that the way a procedure is written, and the language used, will change according to its purpose and the intended audience.

**Writing** – 3/4 students have been working on procedural writing by recording their own set of instructions about something they could confidently guide another person to make, do or play. They have also spent time discussing and classifying different types of procedural texts, as well as identifying the author's purpose.

#### Numeracy:

Continuing on from last week, the students are focusing on fractions and the different ways it can be represented – part of a group, number line, fraction bar, fraction circle. The students have been learning to accurately represent fractions (*less than one > improper fractions* and *mixed numbers*) on a number line and using number lines to compare different fractions. Following on from this the students are beginning to look at how fractions relate to decimals.

#### **Religious Education:**

This week the students continue to explore the Four Steps of Reconciliation - **admit responsibility, say sorry, receive forgiveness, make amends**. The students are also looking at everyday situations of conflict and discussing the effect that a refusal to forgive would have on friendships, families, class and the school community.

#### Homework:

There is no homework this week due to it being a short week.

#### **Mathematics**

This week we continue reviewing the four operations using the Bar Model; mental and written strategies. Students are also exploring language and concepts relating to angles to assist planning and improving their marble runs. Mrs Patterson's sessions with the Year 6 students have been successful and will continue throughout the Term. Mrs Patterson will also be assisting classroom teachers in assessing Year 5 students on an individual basis.

#### **Literacy**

The focus in Literacy will be Literacy Circles, exploring vocabulary and discovering etymology of known and unknown words. Students will continue to focus on expository texts and will be constructing a variety of non-fiction writing to accompany their STEM and Virtual Show tasks. Students have made circuits this week and looked at explanatory scientific texts.

#### <u>RE</u>

Discovering our Christian Heritage - Students explore Christianity in the context of its origins in Judaism. Students will also be made aware that there are strong links among the basic beliefs of the world's three monotheistic faiths – Christianity, Judaism and Islam. Students have explored the book of Genesis and have discussed why and when this was written.

#### **Social Media - Top Tips for Parents**

- Talk to children about online privacy issues, making sure they know to never to identify personal information such as their full name, address, age, school and don't ever post photos in school uniform.
- Teach your children to respect people's privacy and don't share anyone else's personal information online without permission.
- Don't tag photos of your children at their school if your accounts are not set to completely private. This is a child safety issue as anyone driving past can search the school on Instagram and see all of the photos that have been tagged at the school, often by parents who have not set their account to private on Instagram. If your account is not completely private, anyone can see your photos of your child, their name, the name of the cat ,where you go on holiday, what your family does on weekends, when birthdays were and other information about your family and your life. Therefore a complete stranger could make up a story that could be very convincing to your child by using the information you have shared in a public forum of more than 500million users.
- If you are going to post anything with a significant fact, check it first.
- Teach your children to understand the importance of passwords, keeping them private and changing regularly.
- Learn how to recognise a scam. If it is too good to be true, it probably is.
- Make sure the apps you allow your kids to use are age appropriate.
- Don't be patronising or insulting to anyone. This kind of behaviour validates bad behaviour in children as they often see it if you are connected to young people on social media.

- Ban devices from the bedroom from as young as possible. Set boundaries around use.
- Share pictures and videos only with consent. And respect the privacy of others.
- Keep your love-life and arguments off social media.
- Stay positive. If you see something you disagree with don't engage.
- Consider the fact that children in the background of photos or videos you take at your child's school may be on "no publish" lists. Some children are in protective custody or witness protection and an innocent photo posted on social media could be disastrous.
- Teach young people not to say, or repeat anything that they wouldn't say if the person were standing right in front of them.
- Recognise that other people's opinions may be different to their own and that does not give them permission to attack those opinions online.
- Remember that even an emoji can be taken out of context by someone reading it.
- Use your head and your heart and don't let emotion be the only thing driving you to post.
- Make sure you respect classification on games, they are there for a reason.
- Make sure the young people in your care know that under no circumstances they should go and meet up with anyone they meet online. Stranger Danger rules apply because they are now literally on digital steroids and 24x7.

#### Age Recommendations-

This online game has become the go-to Pandemic entertainment of the past few months. The game is very simple, and has been in existence since 2018, but its popularity has exploded with the advent of the global pandemic.

The game is available on all mobile devices and on computer where it has a substantial following on Discord, and Steam.

Players on the game streaming service Twitch, TikTok and major YouTube stars have all played with millions of viewers tuning in. As an example of just HOW popular this game is – a recent New York Times articles referenced at least 200 millions hours logged by users viewing others playing the game on Twitch alone just this year. The majority of players come from the 13 -20 age group, but the numbers of adults participating is increasing.

#### What it is?

The premise is simple.

The game involves 4-10 players being confined on a space ship in desperate need of repairs. Every player is given a random designation as either a crew mate or an imposter. Players must move around the space ship trying to complete given tasks while trying to out the imposters before they destroy the ship.

Players suspected of being the imposter are voted off the ship by team members, with the loser being ejected from an airlock into space.

An imposter is actually an alien, seeking to murder the crew before the repairs can be completed. The crew wins when they complete the repairs, the imposter when all the crew have been taken out.



The graphics are very simple, with minimal graphic realties that are typical to many online multiplayer games.



In reality there is a considerable similarity to old school board games such as Cluedo. This is an online whodunit, where once dead, the player may still watch the outcome, but must remain silent about their death and who killed them.

There is a 90 second window offered at times throughout the game where players are able text chat and grill the other players on their suspicions and deductions.

Most messaging is between player is via text windows, and the language content is heavily censored. Drop the F- bomb, and all you will see is \*\*\*\*. Users names may at times border on the offensive but the language control is excellent.

At this time, the game itself does not offer multiplayer live chat.

#### BUT.

It is possible to use third party chat apps whilst playing, with Discord being the most versatile and the most common. Given that Discord is largely an invite only chat room host, players can control the access to voice chat, not allowing random players to join the conversation without an invite to a private chat space. Children must always be advised not communicate with strangers online.

#### Issues.

The behaviours required to survive on the space ship, and ultimately obtain victory over team mates involves flattering the strong, attacking the weak, lying, obfuscating and engaging in deceptive behaviours. The subterfuge necessary to stay on the space ship may not be reflective of values parents wish to see their younger children engaging in or learning about, nor may the requirement that the imposter must assassinate all other team members to win appeal.

The most risk comes from the group of 10 playing being randomly selected from global participants and players failing to keep their personal information secure.

Players have reported individuals sharing Snap Chat and other social media contact details via the text chat option, and all people playing this game should be reminded that keeping personal details offline whilst playing such a game is vital.

In app purchases are available. This maybe irresistible for a child, so using a prepaid credit card with a set limit can prevent any accidental purchases being run up without a parent being aware.

The developer's original intent was for this game to played in the same room as the other players- and as a family activity – this could provide an entertaining option, and allow parents to engage with their children online, and at the same time model good digital behaviour.

#### Summary.

Play this with your children and respect the age restrictions.

Play the game with your child and decide for yourself if this game is appropriate for your child. Advise younger players to keep all personal details and other social media accounts private and never chat with strangers. Create a group of your childs personal friends to play together.

"Among us" is everywhere right now and looks to only expand in popularity, of the games being played during the pandemic – this is possibly the most innocuous if basic online safety rules be followed.
