Show and Tell aims to support student's speaking and listening skills when interacting with others by listening to and responding orally to the communication of others in informal and structured classroom situations using interaction skills, including listening, while others speak.

Religion: Our unit for the beginning of this term is, **"Called to Live Like Jesus"**. The students have been viewing books about 'kindness' and what it looks like. They have responded through discussion and role-playing different scenarios.

Literacy: Big Books: Mother's Day books! Mrs Patterson, 'Mummy You're Special, 'My Mum's the Best', Me and My Mum' 'Dear Mum I Love You' 'Some Mums''. Mrs Shaw, 'Some Mums, Nanny Dudes, With My Mummy!'

Reading Focus: I read so it sounds right and makes sense (read for meaning). I can segment the first few letters of a word and combine this with using the picture and the meaning of the story to help me solve the word (using the letter sounds and meaning together, to solve). The children are quickly learning to read the '20 Clay words'. These are practiced daily in both reading and writing. They are the most frequently read words in early readers and knowing these words helps the children in becoming fluent readers. Some children have already received the next 100 words to learn.

Writing Focus: I can write down the sounds I hear to make words.

Students enjoyed a variety of Mother's Day tasks this week; you will receive these on Sunday. They will continue to practice writing by completing a variety of tasks; learning how to compose a message and then write this down, drawing pictures, labelling, lists and learning to write some high frequency words. We will continue our alphabet using THRASS picture cards, using cued articulation. We have introduced the THRASS consonant chart with the students and continue to look at the short vowels sounds; a,e,i,o,u. We have also discussed that the vowels can also say their name. Eg 'e' as in me and 'i' as in tiger.

Understand that punctuation is a feature of our writing and that these are different from letters. They will recognise how capital letters are used for names, and that a capital letter and full stops signal the beginning and end of a sentence.

Mathematics: Every Mathematics session incorporates counting and place value tasks. We also explore other mathematical areas which are varied weekly. This week the students will be exploring mass. They will use direct and indirect comparisons to decide which is heavier or holds more and explain reasoning in everyday language. Comparing objects directly, by placing one object against another to determine; which holds more by pouring from one container into the other. They are encouraged to use suitable language associated with measurement attributes, such as 'heavy' and 'heavier', 'holds more' and 'holds less'.



Inquiry (MAPPEN): 'Our Sustainable World'

In this unit they will be exploring the conditions required for sustaining the environment. This week we will focus on why the bins are different colours. We will also visit the garden bed near the front sandpit and explain that we will be doing some planting of bulbs in this garden in the coming weeks.

4R's Program (Rights, Resilience and Respectful Relationships):

This week the focus is 'Being kind and being brave'.

We will share the Storybook – Rose meets Mr Wintergarten. We will reflect on the story with the following focus questions; How did the children feel when they were playing with the ball together? When you play a good game with friends, how do you feel? How do you think the boy felt when he kicked the ball over the fence? The children were scared to go into Mr Wintergarden's house to get the ball. Rose was brave when she knocked on his door. Can you think of a time when you have been afraid? Can you think of a time when you have been brave? When Rose met Mr Wintergarden, he was grumpy and he was lonely. Rose had afternoon tea with him and helped him feel happy by opening his curtains to make his house light and bright inside. She also asked her family and friends to tidy his garden. She invited Mr Wintergarden to play with her and her friends. Rose was being kind. How do you think this made Mr Wintergarden feel? Can you tell us about a time when someone was kind to you? How did this make you feel?

Connecting activities, feelings and emotions to words can be difficult for children. A child may have acted in a brave way by standing up for someone or themselves, but they may not see it as brave if it isn't a 'superhero event'. Small activities and acts can be 'big'. This is an important message we share with the children.

Garden Gurus

Year 1/2 Levesque are currently working with some of the other classes in the school to maintain our front gardens. Last week they used many of the vegetables growing in our garden to make grilled eggplant topped with cheese and bacon and silverbeet pie. We look forward to hearing more about their harvest and what they will cook next.

Mass

This week 1/2 Newton will be heading to Mass on Friday at 12:05pm. All families are welcome.

Religious Education:

This week we will be starting our new topic 'Pentecost' in Religious Education. Students will listen to the story *Stella Luna*. Students will then list things that make us feel frightened or afraid. What are some of the things that used to make you scared but do not know that you are older? What or who helped you not to feel frightened? Is it good to be with someone else when you are scared?

Literacy:

During Literacy, each Year 1/2 class will continue to focus on reading unfamiliar texts supported by their teacher to assist with their fluency and comprehension. Students will work on developing their skills in breaking apart words and self-correction. In writing, each class is focusing on informational texts. Students will be exposed to a number of books that contain facts in order to help with their writing. Our spelling sounds this week are 'ow' and 'ou' as in cow and house.

Numeracy:

This week we are starting our new maths topic of subtraction. Teachers will be introducing the topic of subtraction by looking at the symbol, developing an understanding of what "taking away" or "subtraction" means before the formal subtraction symbol is used. An activity that students will look at will be the use of stories that involves subtraction. A great home activity that you can do with your child could be '**Race to Zero'** - using a 100/200 chart - students place counters on 100/200 - roll the dice and count backwards. Students predict numbers that they will land on. This activity can be done using a 6 or 10-sided dice. If you require any of the materials for this game to play at home, please feel free to see your child's teacher.

Inquiry:

This week in Inquiry students will discuss the term 'Decomposition'. Once students have developed a clear understanding they will use 'Our Decomposition timeline' and rubbish pictures, predicting how long it will take for certain items to decompose. They will then be shown a 'Decomposition PowerPoint' which shows how long it will take for certain things to decompose.

RRRR (Rights, resilience and respectful relationships) program:

This week students will focus on the story 'Rose meets Mr Wintergarten' students will then ask to reflect on the story. They then will be asked questions focusing on emotions:

How did the children feel when they were playing with the ball together?

- When you play a good game with friends, how do you feel?
- How do you think the boy felt when he kicked the ball over the fence?

YEAR THREE/FOUR – Karen, Nara, Ellie & Janina

Here we are at Week 3 of Term 2. This week we have enjoyed our Cross-Country event at Merriwa Park. Next week our Year 3 students will be completing their NAPLAN assessments, and all Year 3/4 students have the opportunity to enjoy an excursion to the Wangaratta PAC to watch a performance of 'PAN,' which is being presented by students from Galen College. Earlier this week a permission slip was sent home for next week's Pan performance. If you require another permission slip for your child for this event, please let your child's class teacher know asap.

Literacy: This week during our Reading and Writing sessions we have continued our focus on Expository (Persuasive) texts. In class, students have used a range of texts to reflect upon the language and structural features used to convince a reader of an argument/point of view. Students have now begun to plan for and write their own expositions using the language and structural features identified as effective within persuasive texts.

Spelling: Our focus this week is '-ay' as in b<u>ay</u> and 'ai' as in r<u>ai</u>n. Students will also be exposed to additional grapheme representations of this phoneme such as, '-ea' as in br<u>ea</u>k, '-eigh' as in <u>eigh</u>t, '-ey' as in th<u>ey</u> and '-aigh' as in str<u>aigh</u>t.

Mathematics: This week in Mathematics students have continued to practice reading and writing analogue and digital clocks to the minute. We have also begun to explore the significance of AM and PM notations alongside the connection between 12-hour and 24-hour times. Next, students will continue building their skills in understanding and telling time through the calculation of elapsed time through a range of problem-solving tasks.

Homework: This week for homework, students have a 'Time' board game to play with members of their family at home. The sheet includes instructions for how to play the game and requires players to read and connect digital and analogue clock times. Students are also asked to read each evening and to record a summary of their reading in their Reading logs.

Religious Education: This week in our 'Sacraments of Initiation - Confirmation' unit, students researched the definition of the term *Initiation*, discovering its synonyms to help explore its meaning alongside the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Students then created word clouds using the website **wordart.com** to create class displays of their new understandings.

Students have also begun to learn about the Gifts and Fruits of the Holy Spirit. In class we used the Bible to learn how scripture speaks of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. Galatians 5:22-23 refers to the fruits of the Holy Spirit as love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. In class we will begin to discuss how each of these fruits may look within our own community and wider communities.

Inquiry: This week, in our inquiry unit, 'The Blue Marble,' students have begun learning about the important resources that are provided to us by the earth, including plants, animals, water, forests, metals, sunlight, atmosphere, crops, oil and coal. Students completed activities to sort resources into living and non-living categories and learn about the different ways in which people could use these natural resources sustainably. Through further activities in this unit, students will learn more about what happens when humans don't use natural resources in a sustainable way and will consider how to encourage people to help protect the environment.

Social Media - Top Tips for Parents

- Talk to children about online privacy issues, making sure they know to never to identify personal information such as their full name, address, age, school and don't ever post photos in school uniform.
- Teach your children to respect people's privacy and don't share anyone else's personal information online without permission.
- Don't tag photos of your children at their school if your accounts are not set to completely private. This is a child safety issue as anyone driving past can search the school on Instagram and see all of the photos that have been tagged at the school, often by parents who have not set their account to private on Instagram. If your account is not completely private, anyone can see your photos of your child, their name, the name of the cat ,where you go on holiday, what your family does on weekends, when birthdays were and other information about your family and your life. Therefore a complete stranger could make up a story that could be very convincing to your child by using the information you have shared in a public forum of more than 500million users.
- If you are going to post anything with a significant fact, check it first.
- Teach your children to understand the importance of passwords, keeping them private and changing regularly.
- Learn how to recognise a scam. If it is too good to be true, it probably is.
- Make sure the apps you allow your kids to use are age appropriate.
- Don't be patronising or insulting to anyone. This kind of behaviour validates bad behaviour in children as they often see it if you are connected to young people on social media.

- Ban devices from the bedroom from as young as possible. Set boundaries around use.
- Share pictures and videos only with consent. And respect the privacy of others.
- Keep your love-life and arguments off social media.
- Stay positive. If you see something you disagree with don't engage.
- Consider the fact that children in the background of photos or videos you take at your child's school may be on "no publish" lists. Some children are in protective custody or witness protection and an innocent photo posted on social media could be disastrous.
- Teach young people not to say, or repeat anything that they wouldn't say if the person were standing right in front of them.
- Recognise that other people's opinions may be different to their own and that does not give them permission to attack those opinions online.
- Remember that even an emoji can be taken out of context by someone reading it.
- Use your head and your heart and don't let emotion be the only thing driving you to post.
- Make sure you respect classification on games, they are there for a reason.
- Make sure the young people in your care know that under no circumstances they should go and meet up with anyone they meet online. Stranger Danger rules apply because they are now literally on digital steroids and 24x7.
