As a twenty-one year old, having been in the workforce for six years (I did HSC as a 15 year old), I'd finally decided to pursue a career in teaching. This was mainly due to a number of friends who were, by that stage, teaching in schools and recount stories of the trials and tribulations of teaching. By comparison my office job was nowhere near as exciting or life giving. The more stories that I heard, the more I could see myself in this role.

I now look back on my time as a teacher with great affection. The gift of educating young people has never been taken for granted by me. I am blessed to have had such a wonderful career working with fantastic, students, parents and teachers. It is a gift of life.

Some people can go through life never being aware of God in the world. Others can look at beautiful vistas and get a sense of spirituality. As for me, everyday, I see how special and precious life is as I watch these students develop through the years. They are my vista, my sense of the spiritual. MANAGING ILLNESS IN SCHOOLS AND EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES DURING THE CORONAVIRUS (COVID - 19) PANDEMIC

What you need to know:

If a child becomes unwell during the day, they must be collected from school/early childhood education and care (ECEC) as soon as possible.

2. If a child has any of the symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) outlined below, however mild, they should get tested and they must remain at home until they receive their results:

- fever
- chills or sweats
- cough
- sore throat
- shortness of breath
- runny nose
- loss of sense of smell or taste.

Vocabulary/Morphology activities:

Find the synonym or antonym: If your child has a set of spelling or tricky reading words she's working on this week, you can play games to build the words' meaning words. Decide whether the object of the game is to name antonyms or synonyms for the words. Once that is established, one player selects a word. Set a timer for one minute. See how many antonyms or synonyms each player can come up with in that time. For example: humid – muggy. Close, steamy, oppressive, stuffy. Discuss tricky word meanings and try to put them into meaningful sentences. You could use pen and paper and ask each player to write their words down.

Welcome back to, what we are hoping, will be a regular school term for everyone. It was such a thrill to meet and greet your beautiful children as they arrived for their first week of Term 4. Thank you to the parents for all the efforts you put in to ensure your children continued their education through Remote Learning.

Can the children please bring back to school the Week 1 – Term 4 Art activity (8 October) which went home in their last H.E.L.P pack. Reading:

The children will continue with independent reading. The teachers will be reviewing progression over the Remote Learning time checking that children are reading and comprehending at the appropriate level.

Writing:

The topic is Spring, and the children will create shape poems such as Haiku, using templates filled with their ideas. The children will also look at Who, What, When, Where and Why in order to expand their writing in order to expand their content.

Spelling:

This week the children will select their own spelling words from recent writing or words from their Take-Home Readers which they have found difficultly reading.

Numeracy:

Exploring capacity, bottle flipping – the mathematics of fractions, a fraction is a way of representing a 'whole' divided into 'equal parts'

Science:

The children will learn about Earth and Space.

<u>Art</u>:

This week we are making a car/truck etc using boxes, straws, skewers, plastic wheels (this is why we need the plastic wheels returned).

Religious Education:

Whoever you are – How are you the same/different from someone in your family, favourite memories, favourite songs and how they make you feel, being kind to others.

Literacy:

This week in **Reading**, the children will continue focusing on reading a range of different types of text including novels of their own choice, news articles from Kids News, Reading Eggspress and Tim Faulkner reading activities.

In **Writing**, the students have been working on writing biographies. This continues on from our autobiographical writing during Remote Learning. Students will research a person and write about their life, family, education and the impact they have had on society. The **Spelling** focus this week is: oo (m**oo**n) ew (scr**ew**) ue (gl**ue**).

Numeracy:

This week in Numeracy the Year 3 and 4 students are working on addition and subtraction - inverse operations. Students will learn that 6 + 4 = 10 4 + 6 = 10 10 - 4 = 6 10 - 6 = 4

Religious Education:

Our first unit this term is 'Jesus Models Forgiveness'. In this unit students will be given an opportunity to understand that Jesus teaches us about healing, forgiveness and reconciliation. Through the Scriptures the students will come to know Jesus' loving acceptance of others.

Mathematics

This week we have will be revising multiplication and division. The students completed a pre-test to gain their level of knowledge in this area. Tasks will then be set, and students guided through learning relevant to individual needs. Students will be exploring a variety of strategies and determining which strategy is best for which problem. In addition to vertical and mental strategies like partitioning, rounding and compensating, students will also be using the visual BAR model to solve problems.

Literacy

The focus in Literacy will be Literacy Circles, exploring vocabulary and discovering etymology of known and unknown words. Students will continue to focus on expository texts and will be constructing a variety of non-fiction writing to accompany their STEM and virtual Show tasks.

<u>RE</u>

Discovering our Christian Heritage - Students explore Christianity in the context of its origins in Judaism. Students will also be made aware that there are strong links among the basic beliefs of the world's three monotheistic faiths – Christianity, Judaism and Islam.
