Who among us can really visualise what 190,000 American deaths look like or the millions of people worldwide that have contracted this insidious virus?



The booking form for essential service workers for next week was sent out today. Please remember to complete it by 4.00pm on Friday, after which, we close the site.

If your situation changes after the survey has closed, then you will need to contact me so that I can make the necessary changes.

<u>A final link</u> will also be sent out <u>NEXT Wednesday</u>, to cover the first week back of Term Four. It is important that essential service people fill out this link if they require their child/ren to attend school during the final week of remote learning. This link will be closed on Friday 18th September (last day of term three).

E-safety Message

Yesterday, I emailed to all known families, an alert that I had received regarding a particularly distasteful upload to social media (ie Facebook, TicTok, Twitter, Instagram etc). I took the advice to notify parents based on a trusted source.

I notice that it was all over the media yesterday and today. Please remember to check what your children are accessing. Primary students should not be on social media in the first place, although I am not so naïve as to know that some students have accounts on Facebook and the like. Please keep a close watch over the next few days as the said content would be highly distressing. Students know not to use school devices to access social networking sites. A breech of this rule is the withdrawal of the device from use. Students would then need to access hard copies of their remote learning materials.

Early Arrivals at school

Please ensure that students attending school do not arrive prior to 8.30am. Ideally, at the moment, 8.45am is the best time.

St Patrick's Church Services

Due to Stage Three Restrictions for COVID19, all Church Services have been put on hold until these restrictions ease. Let's hope that is sooner rather than later.

Health Requirements

Just a reminder that, if your child is unwell (cough, fever, runny nose etc), then they must stay away from school until recovered. If you are unsure of their condition, then please seek medical advice. Here is the medical advice that I have received from the Department of Education:

MANAGING ILLNESS IN SCHOOLS AND EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES DURING THE CORONAVIRUS (COVID - 19) PANDEMIC

One of the most important things we can do to slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) in our community is to stay at home when we are unwell, even when we have the mildest of symptoms.

What you need to know:

If a child becomes unwell during the day, they must be collected from school/early childhood education and care (ECEC) as soon as possible.

- 2. If a child has any of the symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) outlined below, however mild, they should get tested and they must remain at home until they receive their results:
- fever
- · chills or sweats
- cough
- sore throat
- shortness of breath
- runny nose
- loss of sense of smell or taste.

In certain circumstances headache, muscle soreness, stuffy nose, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea may also be considered symptoms.

There will be one more literacy and numeracy pack for you to collect **this Friday, the 11th September**, in readiness for Week 10 - the last week of Term 3 and Week 1, the first week of Term 4.

Remember if you need any help, please don't hesitate to contact us via email or Seesaw. This Sunday will be the last posting of the weekly planner for you this term and then we will post the planning for week 1 Term 4, on Sunday night the 5th October.

Religion

The students will continue the Religious Education unit called, 'I am special so are you!"
The outcome is - 'Recognise similarities and differences between themselves and others.'
Students write down 4 of their friends or 4 family members. Students need to write or draw 4 things that are the same and 4 things that are different for each person.

Literacy

There will be a Big Book posted on Sunday night for the weekly writing activities. We will continue the Fairy-tale books.

Thank you for continuing to read with your child every day. Remember, your child can read the PM books that are set up online, https://app.pmecollection.com.au/login.

They can use the password and username that was sent home with your child.

Maths

The students will continue the unit, 'Sharing' this week. The students will use objects to share them evenly. There are worksheets in the student's take home packs to complete. Students will be using a range of practical strategies for sharing small groups of numbers, such as visual displays or concrete materials and using verbal action stories to model situations that involve sharing.

In the activities section of Seesaw, you may also find Science, Italian and Music sessions.

Important days to remember: Friday 18th September – Term 3 ends Monday 5th October – Term 4 commences New packs will be available from the front office this Friday 11th September. The packs will contain 2 weeks of learning heading into the last week of term 3 and the first week of term 4. Hopefully come Week 2 we can all be back at school as your teachers are really missing you!!

It is important students maintain their learning whilst at home so that they don't fall behind in their learning. Setting up a good routine and expectations is paramount. If your child attends school on site part time, the school days when they are at home, they are still required to complete their work for the required day.

Literacy focus

- Writing our focus this week has been on handwriting and incorporating our focus of fairy tales and gardening expertise to write procedural texts.
- Grammar suffixes
- Spelling 'k' as in kit, 'and' as in hand and 'oa' as in road. Take a look back at the Spelling rubric from our Remote Learning pack to find some additional activities you might like to try at home.
- •Please ensure students are reading at home. This week we have asked students to record themselves reading so we can listen to them read remotely. Don't forget to fill in your yellow reading logs during Remote Learning. We have encouraged students to take a photo of their reading logs on a Friday and upload this to Seesaw so we can see all the wonderful reading that is happening at home. If you require a new set of books, we recommend swapping your packs over when you come into school to collect the H.E.L.P packs.

Numeracy focus

• This week our activities have focused on fractions of a group. Students have been investigating numerical and visual representations of halves, quarters and eighths of collections.

Inquiry focus

•Our inquiry focus is coming to an end very soon and we have thoroughly enjoyed learning about how things have changed through the generations and also pondering what things may look like in the future. The interview activity provided students with some valuable insights as to how some things have changed whilst other things have stayed the same.

Reading: This week the students will continue working on a variety of comprehension tasks using platforms such as Reading Eggspress, Kids News, Tim Faulkner's Animal Tales and activities

from Comprehension and Detail Task Cards. This week's Kids News articles are 'Beaker Street Science Photography Prize 2020 finalists' (Green level) and 'She is on our \$20 banknote, but few know the story of Mary Reibey' [Orange level]. In Tim Faulkner's Animal Tales students will learn all about the Funnel-Web Spider Venom Program.

In Writing: This week, students are starting a new information report about a topic of their choice. They will continue following the steps outlined in the Google Slides instructions related to researching specific details about their chosen topic, before editing and publishing their findings.

In Spelling, students are completing a variety of activities such as word sorting, breaking words into phonemes and creating sentences. They are also completing Reading Eggspress Spelling tasks related to the focus sound. During the course of the week students are also completing an editing task in which they are challenged to find and correct errors in a piece of writing.

This week in **Maths**, students are learning about different 'Subtraction Mental and Written Strategies'. Each day students are completing tasks from Studyladder as well as workbook activities that are focused on assisting them to develop efficient strategies so as to confidently complete subtract equations and algorithms.

In **Religious Education** this week, the students watched and reflected on a video featuring the environmental activist, Greta Thunberg. Students were challenged to consider and respond to how they could look after our planet.

Canberra 'Virtual' Camp

Wow, what a wonderful 4 days we had on our Canberra Camp. Whilst it certainly wasn't the same as 'being there in person', the students learnt a lot about the various locations we had planned to visit. Reading their reflections has shown many students would love to take their families there for an adventure!

Mathematics

This week we have commenced our unit on Time. The students completed a pre-test to gain their level of knowledge in this area. Tasks will then be set, and students guided through learning relevant to their needs.

Literacy

The focus in Literacy during remote learning is the continuing reading comprehension skills through literacy circles, kid's news tasks and the students listening to a number of podcasts related to our Inquiry topic of Democracy. In writing, the students are being exposed to a range of expository styles within the non-fiction genre. This week students will create persuasive posters, poems, letter writing and essays surrounding issues of interest to the students.

<u>RE</u>

We are celebrating the Season of Creation. It is an annual ecumenical celebration of prayer and action to protect creation. It takes place from Sept 1st, the World Day of Prayer for Creation to Oct 4th the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi. This year's event takes place within the context of the special Laudato Si' Anniversary Year, which Pope Francis opened on Sunday, 24 May the 5th anniversary of his encyclical. The context for this year is "the precarious state of Our Common Home", with Pope Francis asking, "What kind of world do we want to leave those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?"

Remote Learning Update:

We continue to be impressed by the growth in resilience and problem-solving strategies shown by the students. We continue to try and provide a range of interest base activities to keep students motivated. This week we are discussing 'striving for accuracy' and encouraging students to proofread and check their own work before submitting. This is not always an easy task, as students require substantial teacher feedback to be able to improve their work, however, basic spell and grammar checks or checking for suitable content and any errors in work before submitting will be encouraged.
