# School Hats

During term four school hats are required to be worn outside as part of the school's Sunsmart Policy. Students who do not have a hat will be restricted to play under the pavilion at school to protect them from the sun. Hats need to be sun safe (baseball style caps are not permitted).

## Face Masks

We ask that parents send their child to school with a face mask if they are in Years 3 to 6. Please make sure that they are appropriately marked as they are only required to be worn indoors and the students are not required to wear them during recess/lunch times whilst outdoors (unless they choose to do so). The school has a limited number of masks to supply to students who lose or break theirs whilst at school to ensure that we maintain a standard.

# New Face Mask Regulations

We have received new directives from the Victorian Chief Health Officer regarding the wearing of face masks at school for Primary aged students (Years 3 to 6). I have included the relevant directives from the current government guidelines (below).

1. Please see coronavirus.vic.gov.au for the latest face mask requirements. For all school settings, the Victorian Chief Health Officer Directs:

• students in Year 3 to Year 6 to wear face masks when indoors on school premises, unless an exception applies

• **Recommends** that all other children wear face masks when at school, attending an OSHC program, or when travelling to and from school on public transport, taxis or ride share vehicles. There are a number of lawful reasons for not wearing a face mask, including for staff and students who are unable to wear a face mask due to the nature of their disability, medical or a mental health condition.

A face mask must cover the nose and mouth. Face shields, scarves or bandanas do not meet these requirements.

We ask that parents send their child to school with a face mask if they are in Years 3 to 6. Please make sure that they are appropriately marked as they are only required to be worn indoors and the students are not required to wear them during recess/lunch times whilst outdoors (unless they choose to do so).

# Current COVID Restrictions for Schools

Just a reminder to parents that you can only come onto the school site for essential reasons. If you are dropping your child off it is preferable that you do this at one of the school gates - Ovens St and Ryley St. If you do need to come into any of the school buildings, <u>you must enter through the front office and check in, regardless of the time spent in the building. YOU MUST WEAR A MASK AT ALL TIMES. PLEASE do not enter any of the classrooms through the school grounds.</u>

Outside of School Hours Care (OSHC) Parents may enter the school via the Ovens St Gate to collect their child/ren from child care. They are only permitted to the front entrance of the hall to sign their child out. A mask must be worn at all times please.

#### **School Operations Guide**

The latest school Operations guidelines require that:

- Hand hygiene and cleaning regimes are in place
- Visitors are restricted to staff and health and wellbeing support with record keeping
- No assemblies or liturgies
- Libraries can be open
- Shared drink taps open
- Sports programs are permitted with conditions

Families are asked to keep students exhibiting symptoms similar to cold and flu at home until the symptoms go or they have been cleared by a doctor. It is important that we are all vigilant when it comes to spotting potential problems with COVID 19.

# WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOM

#### FOUNDATION – Trish & Grace

Term 4 Week 7

Welcome to week 7. The students will be visiting the Year 1/2 classrooms tomorrow, whilst the kinder students come to school for their second visit. These are not the class groupings for next year, just a chance to interact with the teachers and students.

#### **REMINDERS:**

- This Friday is the Book Parade! Students can come dressed as their favourite book character.
- Swimming Permission Forms these went home earlier this week. Please return them ASAP.
- There have been a couple of head lice cases in the Foundation area. Please check your child's hair and treat it immediately if lice or eggs are present. We appreciate your cooperation in this area, thank you.

**RELIGIOUS EDUCATION**: We continue our unit, 'We Celebrate Christmas'. We have discussed how we celebrate in different ways. This week we will explore the concept of waiting and preparing for special events in our lives and then we will explore the celebration of Jesus' birth. Through the time of Advent the students will be making their own Advent wreath and learning about this special time of waiting.

**LITERACY:** Our daily Heggerty Phonemic Awareness program and learning how to use the THRASS chart, have both continued to be a major focus with both reading, writing and spelling. We have been focusing on explicit instruction in the following phonological and phonemic awareness skills: Rhyming, Onset Fluency, Blending, Isolating final and medial phonemes (sounds), Segmenting, Adding Phonemes, Deleting Phonemes and Substituting Phonemes.

When reading, we have been concentrating on making our reading 'sound right' and using the meaning of what we are reading to help us solve words when 'sounding out' is difficult in isolation. We have also been discussing how making pictures in our minds when listening to stories, helps us understand what we're reading.

#### BIG BOOKS: Patterson - Dinosaurs

#### SHOW AND TELL:

Week 7: A sentence/story I have written Week 8: Something that rolls Week 9: A book I can read

**MATHS:** This week we are focusing on representing practical situations to model sharing. Students will be using a range of practical strategies for sharing small groups of numbers, such as visual displays or concrete materials. They will be using verbal action stories to model situations that involve sharing. Students listened to the story; 'Who rang the doorbell?' By Pat Hutchins (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ESHLF92 rBw</u>).They discussed sharing of the biscuits. What happened when more people arrived at the house? Students then created their own story of 'Who rang the doorbell?' using a template of the biscuits and plates to create the book.

#### Religion -

Our Call to Mission - we continue this unit by revising what we know about Jesus and the kindness that he shared with others, by revising Bible stories. Students will write a list of random acts of kindness that they have seen and are encouraged to continue to do.

#### Literacy -

This week, we begin our Poetry unit by looking at different forms of poetry such as Acrostic poems - a poem in which certain letters of each line spell out a word, name, or phrase when read vertically. Haiku poems - a poem that focuses on the syllables in each line. Limerick - poems that follow a sequence to rhyme. The students will enjoy writing a variety of poetry.

During reading, students will continue to read independently, whole groups and work in their reading groups focusing on fluency and ensuring that they use punctuation to help them read. The students will answer a variety of who, what, where, when and why questions. They will think about questions beginning with how, and if to deepen their thinking.

This week's phoneme is 'oo' as in - book, hood, foot, pull, push etc. Students will create wordlists and investigate the phoneme.

#### Mathematics -

This week in Mathematics we are revising addition and subtraction. Students will be provided with activities that assist them to identify the relationship between these symbols and also completing worded problems. Students will be encouraged to name and explain the strategies they use to solve these equations such as counting forwards/counting back to find the difference, using double facts and friends of ten.

#### <u>4 R's</u>

This week in the 4R's program students are looking at 'creating a gender friendly classroom'. Students will be involved in a game called 'Harmony'. The aim of the game is for the group to follow the actions of the leader so that the group looks like it is moving as one. (E.g. slow, fluid, flowing movements, such as those in Tai Chi).

Appoint a 'leader' to begin and provide an opportunity for the group to practice. Encourage the 'leader' to change the movement providing the group time to read, adjust and follow. After a short time appoint a new 'leader'. Once the game is completed students will be asked questions for example:

- What skills do we need to work in harmony in this game, or to move all as one?
- Can girls and boys be leaders?

#### Inquiry -

This week in Inquiry, students will begin to create an object with a purpose, using recycled items. Objects made may include a treasure chest made from a box that held cereal, money box from a yoghurt container. If you have any suitable recycled materials such as paper towel rolls, cereal boxes, clean tins, these would be greatly appreciated. These can be sent into Mrs Bray's classroom before Friday.

#### Homework:

This week's homework task involves exploring figurative language which is used to encourage a reader's imagination. There are different types of figurative language: *alliteration -* repeats consonant sounds; *onomatopoeia -* imitates sounds; *simile -* compares one thing to another using the words 'like' or 'as'; *metaphor -* makes comparisons but without using 'like' or 'as'.

#### Literacy:

In Writing, students are continuing to compose their script for a scene from their own story plan or borrowed from a book of their choice. These scripts will then be used as part of the filming of students' short animation films. In Reading, students are continuing to complete a range of comprehension activities, based on both fiction and non-fiction text types, which includes analysing character feelings and motivations, using and identifying figurative language, as well as exploring and responding to the media platforms Kids News and Behind the News (BTN).

#### Inquiry:

Students are continuing with their '*Frame by Frame*' Inquiry unit. This week, the students have continued to work on creating a storyboard for their scene of choice and are incorporating their ideas for characters, settings and props. Our Digital Technology studies have worked alongside our inquiry and have begun to prepare the students for the use of coding or stop motion animation in their films. Our Google Computer Science lessons are helping students learn how they can incorporate good dialogue with figurative language to create interesting characterisation in their films.

#### Spelling:

This week we are reviewing high frequency words with irregular spelling patterns that can often be spelled incorrectly. We are also exploring the following homophones in context: rain/reign; hi/high; rode/road; piece/peace; witch/which. We are also developing our understanding of the following forms of figurative language, similes (making comparisons between objects or ideas using the words 'like' or 'as') and personification (the act of giving non-human things, human characteristics).

#### Mathematics:

This week the Year 3/4 classes are continuing to investigate written multiplication strategies. Students are exploring the use of the split strategy, the grid strategy or vertical multiplication in solving multiplication problems which include numbers with 2 or more digits. For example, the split strategy can be used to help solve 45 x 3. First expand the number into 40 and 5, then multiply each by 3.  $40 \times 3 = 120$ , and  $5 \times 3 = 15$ . Then we add these products together; 120 + 15 = 135, this solves our original problem 45 x 3.

#### **Religious Education:**

This week we have begun our final Religious Education unit, 'Christmas - The Promise Fulfilled'. In this unit students will explore how Christmas is a fulfilment of God's promise and a time to celebrate Jesus' birth. Advent is a time of looking forward to the fulfilment of that promise. At Christmas we celebrate Jesus with us today by living lives of love and service to others. *As an introductory task, students have written their own promises - one for school and one for home, and they will reflect on these promises at the conclusion of our school year.* 

**Uniform:** In Term 4 hats are compulsory for students to wear when outdoors at school. Please ensure your child has a St Patrick's hat with them in their bag, for school. Students are required to wear their full summer uniform. Please ensure that all uniform items are clearly labelled with your child's name.

**Masks**: Students in Year 3 and above are asked by the Victorian Government to bring in masks from home to wear in class. We ask that parents please check to see if their children have a mask ready for school each day, as we are finding that many students have misplaced or forgotten their masks. Thank you for helping us to follow this Government mandate.

#### Literacy:

In Writing we have been working on exposition texts. Students have been working on writing a Sizzling Start which grabs the attention of the reader as soon as they start reading. We will continue working on these for the next couple of weeks. We have also been investigating Mrs Wordsmith's Word of the Day and writing a short story using the new word.

Here is Luca D'Agostino's story using the word **Splattered**.

# Banter vs bullying



Banter is typically playful teasing between friends, whether it's an inside joke between school mates or a meme you're sharing in a group chat. But sometimes it can go too far.

Banter is meant to be light-hearted and friendly, but sometimes it can be taken too far, or escalate into bullying behaviour. You might not even realise you're doing it.

The way we talk online can also make it more difficult to know where to draw the line between banter and bullying.

It can be easy to misinterpret a comment or post, when you can't see someone's face or hear the tone of the person who posted it. In the same way, you might not have intended to hurt someone's feelings, but what you thought was friendly banter, could be considered bullying to someone else. Here is how you can help keep it friendly.

## What to do

#### Don't get too personal

Set some limits. Picking on someone's appearance or aspects of their identity, like their gender, race, sexuality or religion, should not be material for funny banter. They might make fun of these things themselves, but it's a good idea to avoid these topics altogether. Also, if this is someone you know really well, you probably already know some things that your friend is insecure about. If you are aware it is a sensitive subject, it's best to not go there!

#### Saying 'I was only joking' after the fact, doesn't help

Even if you just mean it as a joke, it's best to apologise if you made someone feel upset. Try not to argue about how you intended the joke to be taken. Doing this can often inflame the situation. Put yourself in their shoes for a moment and remember, the best way to fix the situation is to apologise.

#### Don't be a bystander

If you feel like someone is taking it too far in a group chat, maybe they're just unaware of how they are making the other person feel. Gently point out to them that what they are saying can be taken the wrong way — you can do this by commenting on a post or by sending them a direct message. When they realise how they are making the other person feel, they'll most likely let up. And if they don't, report it or tell an adult you trust.

If you see that someone is clearly not taking someone else's banter as a joke, reach out to them and ask them if they are OK. Let them know that they can <u>get help and</u> <u>support</u>.
